

NO FLUKE ABOUT GLENELG'S 19-PT. WIN

PORT LINCOLN, Saturday: There was no fluke about Glenelg's 19-point win over Torrens today. The Bays thrashed the Torrens rucks, centre line, and rovers from start to end.

That is the story of the game.

The Bays' win highlighted just what a lot Torrens have sustained in the absence of centreman Bob Hank and ruckman Don Prior.

There is no driving force from the middle.

Hardly smelt ball

Torrens' ruckmen hardly smelt the ball, let alone get near enough to knock it.

Crabb, Hall, and Laffin dominated the bounces and throw-ins.

For Hall, in particular, it was a happy game. He has been out of touch and losing confidence.

Torrens were most unimpressive.

Unless they can remedy quickly the loss of Hank and Prior they will not go far this season.

Stayed at centre

Livesey, who came in for his first game last week, stayed at centre all day, while Head roved or rested at half-forward.

Alf Bailey hardly gave Livesey a kick. It was one of Bailey's best games.

I thought Torrens would have switched Livesey and Cockshell early, after Brian Wright had shut out Cockshell.

Cockshell got no help from the centre line. It must be said for him.

Carr shaded Marshall in the first quarter, and was a solitary driving force for Torrens.

But Carr did not change over at the end of the term.

Torrens apparently wanted to work the stand wing.

Beat Carr

Bay wingman Edwards came across and then beat Carr for the next three quarters, while Marshall also got into the game and beat Lodge.

With the rucks well beaten getting little from the rovers, and less from across centre, Torrens only twice looked like making a game of it — at the start of the third and last quarters.

Early in the last term they cut the Bays' lead to three goals.

It was a disappointing display for Port Lincoln enthusiasts, even though the underdog won.

Glenelg and Torrens best players are hard to pick because the Bays had so many. Torrens so few.

Alan Crabb played a mighty first half in ruck, and was as effective in the field play. He started the Bays off on the right leg.

Hall was little behind him, either following or resting. Stan Wickham played a great game in the back pocket, particularly in the second half.

The winning centre line, Edwards, Alf Bailey, and Marshall, were an important factor, while Davies and Laffin put in strong bursts.

Torrens' bests were mostly in defence.

Alf Roberts, who has not turned in a poor game this season, was best, shadowing Rundle like an FBI man all day.

A timely move in West's field placings changed what could have been a defeat by Norwood into a victory by three clear goals at Kensington today.

Although the Redlegs trailed by one goal at the first interval, Young's excellence at half-forward right, had it been maintained, could easily have won the game for them.

When opposed to a new junior in Ellis, Young figured in most of Norwood's drives.

But awake to that fact, West switched the more experienced Stoll over to check Young and that was, I think, the difference between defeat and success.

Early feature

Marriott's strong ruck work was the early feature of the game but the defence of West, particularly Thomas who did not put a foot wrong all day, was too much for the Norwood attack.

The Redleg bright spots were on the half-forward line where Walker set them going and Young continued with the good work.

Young's continued fine form gave Norwood tremendous drive in the second term.

And a much improved display by Fosdike and Fox, particularly when in the forward pocket, where they got three goals between them added to the Redleg power.

McGregor had a good quarter, his safe handling and coolness being very evident.

FITZGERALD'S GAME

Sturt's nine-point win over North at Unley Oval today can go down in the club's records as "Fitzgerald's game."

There was only one word for Fitzgerald's performance — magnificent.

Rarely has a man dominated a game so much.

When Sturt went in with a 13-point lead at half-time, Fitzgerald had kicked 6.3 of Sturt's 7.10 as a ruckman-rover.

At the end of the game he had kicked 8.5 of Sturt's 14.14.

Fitzgerald took little time to get going, and when he did gave everything in the book.

Winning factors

Sturt, after allowing for Fitzgerald's influence, owed their win to a ruck advantage and pace and steadiness in the last quarter.

At three-quarter time, North led by one point, but Sturt, kicking in the scoring end — the northern — got four goals without a miss to earn a win that will do much towards shaping the final four.

Hit head-on

North opened far better than Sturt despite Fitzgerald.

North were going along nicely when Way and Faggotter met head-on. Both were prostrate in the hands of trainers.

Sturt grasped the initiative and kept it for most of the day.

North had won handsomely across centre, but when they lost Ducker and Way by half-time they had both centre wingmen off.

Impromptu placings left them without their initial balance.

Fine finish

It is debatable whether the result would have been the same, but full marks have to be given Sturt for the way they came home after appearing done midway through the last term. Goodchild, who had played serviceably at centre half-forward all day, came into his own, and with May supplying a steadying influence, and Fitzgerald still a potential

menace. Sturt were able to hold off a plucky North side.

Star players

After Fitzgerald, Goodchild was Sturt's best player. He made nice position, and was a driving force at the right time. His sparkling ground play was allied with safe overhead work.

Phillips, after giving Blunden too much latitude early, settled down to be a brilliant stopper at centre half-back. Shanks was speedy and clever at centre wing while the rovers Kotaris and Sims gave the rucks good support.

Harris was solid in the ruck and in a forward pocket, May although not brilliant, was responsible for many breakaways.

State prospect

For North, Bill McKenzie was highest on the merit card for the way he got his seven goals. He looks the State goalsneak on present form with his mobile leaping and ground play.

Griffin won centre with fine ground play over a wide area.

Gilbourne showed he should not have been left out of the side with a good game at half-forward right. McKay had a very good first half but faded. Weston was solid in support in the back pocket.

Aldenhoven played well against strong ruck opposition, while Bunton, after a quiet opening, was in several helpful passages and kicked two nice goals. McCann was solid at both centre half-back and at full back.

Valuable moves

Both these moves proved successful Packham getting two valuable goals in the second half.

West had run up a handy lead of 14 points at three-quarter time, and it was a true indication of the merits of the two teams.

Each settled down to the ding-dong battle which raged between the respective half back lines, but through sheer force West got in again with an easy goal from Brown.

Half the term was over with still only two goals the difference.

But with only five minutes to play, Packham made it a certainty with a fine long goal.

It was West's fourth successive victory—but this time by three goals, not three points.

It would be hard to choose the best on the

ground, but Thomas in goal for West and Marriott for Norwood, would be hard to separate.

Thomas made no mistakes. He was safe in the air, sure on the ground, and kicked strongly.

Marriott rarely missed anything he went for in the air, and was never beaten in the ruck duels.

Brown roved well for West, particularly in the first half. Kies was an able follower and forward, as was McGregor, who never appears flurried.

Stoll did a great job at half-back. Slattery played soundly in attack and Wright was useful roving.

Next to Marriott, I put Walker for Norwood. He was very sound at centre half-forward marking well and kicking with great power.

Young, although subdued by Stoll, did an excellent job before half-time in Norwood's outer attack.

Roberts was as safe as ever in defence, as were Reimann and Butler. Neilson had a tigerish second half at centre wing.

It appeared at times that each move was calculated and according to plan.

This impression is created by the fact that Port have the players to play the loose-man game to perfection.

Likely premiers

On their form to date they stand out among the premiers contenders. South were not good enough to stop their run.

South must be given credit, however, for their fighting spirit and the excellent way they contested the first half.

It was only in the closing stages of the second quarter that Port made their breakaway.

South's accuracy in front of goal was in direct contrast to their performance last week.

Panizza out

Port were unchanged, but South found it necessary to replace Ray Panizza with Kimber.

Panizza's shoulder did not pass a medical test at the last minute.

Conditions were ideal and Hickinbotham, by winning the toss, gave South first advantage of a useful, but not strong, breeze.

South matched Port early. In fact they held the lead once in the first quarter and recaptured it twice during the second term.

Then Garland struck a purple patch and, with the Port centre line the driving force, the tall forward posted four goals in nearly as many minutes.

Never let up

This burst changed the whole tenor of the game, as it established Port's superiority.

Once on top, the Magpies never let up.

South had six goals on the board before posting their first point.

After half-time Port gave South little chance.

The mobile Port rucks were a tower of strength today and form a composite part of this well-balanced side.

Boyd devastating

For Port, Boyd and McDonald are difficult to separate.

I name Boyd for his big part in getting Port on top.
