Disgusted

Glenelg's chief sources of power in the first half were Marshall, on the wing, B. Wright, a constant threat at centre halfforward, although strongly opposed by Aish, and Potter playing the loose man in attack.

It was in the third quarter that Glenelg, profiting from several positional changes, threw out strong challenge.

Won centre

Jack Oatey's assertion before the game that his side was fit, if nothing else, was justified by the power of Norwood's finish.
