

# PERSISTENCE WON FOR THE BAYS

**Glenelg, less dependent on a preconceived method of attack than Torrens, finally won well with an impressive display of persistence and determination at Thebarton Oval today.**

Torrens seldom has had to look any further than Head for most of its attacking momentum.

It is a tribute to his outstanding ability that he is generally more than equal to the task. However, conditions today robbed his ball handling of its usual magic touch.

As the game progressed, Head was more and more reduced to the ordinary standard.

While it could hardly be said that Alf Bailey won the position, his prodigal expense of energy was a telling factor in the Glenelg set-up.

Like the rest of the side, he just kept on running, and eventually won the reward of perseverance against his more gifted opponent.

The Torrens half-back line was again more easily penetrated than was expected. Hewett did most of the damage here. He was useful on a flank and when shifted across to centre half-forward for the last quarter, had a leading part in the onslaught which followed.

While Glenelg played the guerilla type of game which the conditions demanded, Torrens were hampered by the apparent necessity to seek Clingly at all costs.

Several opportunities of scoring were wasted when players tried to find him when they themselves were within kicking distance.

The Bays lost Wilson before half-time, but did not suffer any serious setback as a result. Longman took over as first rover and combined splendidly with Davies consistently to put Torrens' half-back line on the defensive from the centre bounces.

Torrens' equilibrium was first really upset in the third quarter when for a time Glenelg took complete charge across centre.

Although this marked superiority was short-lived Torrens' confidence suffered a severe jolt and in the end it had no counter to the speed of Davies, Longman, and Hewett.

Although it must be admitted that conditions were more in Glenelg's favor, the Bays' tremendous finish stamps them as a side to be respected by all, except the apparently invincible Port Adelaide.
