Versatility

That Port were saved in the early part of the game, and that they finally succeeded in running down the Bays in the last quarter, can be attributed to their versatility and strength of their smallman game.

Their work near the goals was always the more dangerous, because of the speed of the rovers and the hardy display of Johns, even though it was a great deal less well organised. Glenelg did well at

half-back to make this so, Baillie in particular, doing an excellent job to keep both Garland and Boyd under control.
