
The Magpies began the third term just two points behind after a torrid first half. However, the Tigers were ill-prepared for the onslaught

Port's defence tightened considerably as Trevor Obst and Ken Tierney figured strongly, Geoff Motley, John Cahill and Don Thompson completely dominated the centre line, and Lloyd Zucker and Dave Boyd set up many attacking moves.

In just eight minutes the game was won and lost as Port slammed on four goals from Brian Luke (2), Dave Boyd and Norm Tull. It was all Port as they added 7.5 for the quarter while the Bays could only manage three points. The Tigers' defence had finally cracked under the continual Port barrage, for the Magpies to lead by 42 points at "lemon" time."

Glenelg refused to give in as they made changes in the final term with Fred Pemberton to centre half for-
