Their battle with the fast-finishing, confident Tigers should provide a thrilling opening to the 1959 major round.

Form is not re-assuring

VIC JOHNSON: I am choosing Glenelg to defeat Sturt.

A couple of weeks ago I would have had little hesitation in choosing Sturt, but the Blues' form of late has not been reassuring. They have lost the last three games to Torrens,

Port, and Norwood.

Against that, Glenelg have won their last four games, and I believe they will take the field a fitter team than their opponents.

Goodchild's return is valuable to Sturt, but then Fitzgerald and Douglas, two of Sturt's stars in attack, are under a cloud.

The ovals are hard through lack of good rains, and players with doubtful legs or ankles could be-come a disadvantage. I think Glenelg can reverse the decision of their last meeting.

Superior attack

JEFF PASH: I have a fancy for Sturt, because I think their attack at its best is superior to that of Glenelg.

Results of the last few games have not been reassuring in themselves, but I am assuming both Pitzgerald and Douglas will be fit and that Halbert and Goodchild will be fully conditioned by next Saturday

In defence and about the ruck fringes, Glenelg seem to me the more capable.

Their timing is better. They reach the finals at their top. Yet I still re-spect Sturt's higher percentage and the big game of their stars.

Goodchild is matchwinner

GIL LANGLEY: I expect Sturt to scrape in. Glenelg played better football of late, but will they be able to counteract Sturt's mainstays?

Goodchild is Sturt's lifesaver, and in my book is their best player. game under his belt he could be a matchwinner. Confidence is Glenelg's

saviour. Rovers could play a lead-ing role, with Richens and Rigney being magnets on the fringes. The Sturt rover is a good checker.

Roving is brilliant

SAM GALLAGHER: Gleve finished the

minor round on a high note. They have won their last four games. Sturt have lost their last three.

Much will depend on whether Sturt, with Pitzgerald and Douglas to return, can re-establish their former power in attack.

A feature of Glenelg's late arrival in the final four has been the brilliant roving of Colin Richens and the sudden discovery of fine teamwork.

However, Sturt's rovers, Rigney and Dunn, also are playing well, and they are well backed up by Wil-liams. Roving to Thomp-son, this trio could be hard to stop. .

Everything points to a thrilling encounter, but I lean to Glenelg. They have reached their peak at the right time, while Sturt are struggling to find their earlier certainty.

Glenelg's last-minute inclusion in the final four at the expense of West Torrens was not achieved without anxiety.

Vic Johnson, who saw the match at Prospect, re-ports that North won both wings in the first term and had a brilliant spearhead in Don Lindner.

Lindner got three goals in the first quarter, and North's rovers were on top. Richens found touch in the second quarter to put the Bays back in the game.

There was little in it from then on, but the Bays' more even teamwork and better attack finally won the right to contest the first semi-final. Glenelg won by 12 points.

17th victory without loss

Alberton, went down fighting to the mighty Magpies. Outplayed in the first term, the Eagles fought back well to be only three points down at three-quarter time.

A winning centreline was the main reason for the strong finish which carried Port to a 37-point win.

This was Port's seventeenth win without loss but it was not one of their best. A looseness across half-back and the failure of rucks and rovers to defend adequately was not in the best Magpie style.

Ted Whelan's steadying influence obviously was missed.
