

NORTH MOVE UP ON TABLE

Returning to form after two successive defeats, North Adelaide stopped Norwood's winning run by three points at Kensington today.

This result, coupled with South's surprisingly easy win over Torrens, caused the only change in positions on the premiership table.

North take over second place on percentage from the Eagles.

At Glenelg, West had some anxious moments before clearing out in the last quarter to win by 28 points.

Port's show of power in beating Sturt by 55 points at Alberton is ominous. The Magpies are now undisputed holders of top position.

Norwood, Sturt, and West are locked together in fourth place.

The fight for a place in the finals is further complicated by the doubt that all must have about meeting South after their convincing win today.

DEFICIENCY

At Kensington, Norwood were not able to overcome the loss of Stephens from full forward.

They were beaten on the wings, where Barbary jumped right back to his brilliant best, and Hewett showed a welcome return to form.

Norwood did not persist long with Kneebone at full forward. He was shifted to centre half-back in the second term.

Bunton continued in great form for Norwood, but a deficiency in attack, where Lill also did not have his customary influence, left the Redlegs struggling.

FLOURISH

North's poor goalkicking

left the scores in touch and Norwood came from 17 points down in the last term to within two points, but could get no closer.

North's switch of Pascoe to full forward paid off handsomely. He got five goals on Aish.

At Adelaide, South's enthusiasm and determination were altogether too much for a disinterested Torrens.

The Eagles were held goalless in the first and third terms.

They came home with a fine flourish to kick seven goals in the last quarter. But South's start was too much.

Torrens' expected power points across centre and in ruck did not, or were not allowed to exert any influence on the game until too late.

West, shocked by a great second quarter recovery by Glenelg, regained poise in the third term and went away to a comfortable win.

The chief difference between the teams was at full forward. Bray's seven goals for West won it for them.

A feature of this match was the good form shown by Glenelg's new players.

Conceding Sturt first use of the breeze at Alberton, Port outscored the Blues and had the game won at half-time.

Sturt came back strongly in the third term but were swamped by the Magpies' powerful finish.

From the Port point of

view, perhaps the most significant thing, apart from the return of Cahill and Thompson, was McBain's fine game in shutting out Tony Goodchild.

After next week's series, Norwood will probably be on the outside looking in. They meet Port at Norwood.

Port are gaining power as the season runs on while the Redlegs have stumbled.

Sturt go to Adelaide to face South. They have the skill to win but South will make them earn it.

CONFIDENCE

If there is any lack of resolution in Sturt's approach, they will find South taking full advantage of it.

North take on Glenelg at Prospect. Their win today must have restored confidence and the drive

from a winning centre line should see them safe in second place for the time being.

West Adelaide could be one rung up the ladder after their game against Torrens at Thebarton.

The Eagles are not playing well. Perhaps today's last quarter was the sign of better things to come. But West's speed and understanding in attack will probably be too much for them.
