Port dispel doubts

Port Adelaide today dispelled any lingering doubts about their ability to make this year's finals with a decisive 58-point win over Norwood at Alberton.

The Magpies, safe in third place, moved two games clear of Glenelg, beaten by West's commanding first half in the heavy going at the Bay.

South joined Glenelg and Norwood, equal in fourth place with 10 wins each, but only after Torrens had given them some anxious moments at Adelaide.

South's strong last quarter turned defeat into victory.

At Woodville, the home team, at the bottom of the premiership table, gave league leaders Sturt the shock of their lives in a thrilling game that ended in a draw.

North had the biggest win of the day, going right away from Centrals

to finish 90 points up. Norwood dropped to sixth place behind South on percentage as a result of today's games

Percentage

It is possible that fourth place will be decided on percentage.

If Glenelg, South and Norwood each win one of the remaining two games, the Bays' better percentage would take them into the finals,

If Norwood beat Centrals at Norwood next week they could move ahead of Glenely and South into fourth place.

The Bays meet Sturt

at Unley and South clash with West at Adelaide.

Both South and Norwood must win at least one more game than Glenelg to overcome the Bays' superior percent-

This means that Norwood must win the last match at the Bay and, assuming the Redlegs win next week, it also places the onus on South to win their last two against West and Port.

The probability is that the winner of the Norwood-Glenelg game will be the fourth team in the major round.

How far the last side in will go is doubtful in view of Port's convincing win

The Magpies, with John Cahill in devastating form and getting more from their half-forward line, swept Norwood with a fine display of strength and teamwork. At Glenelg, another determined second half by the Tigers was not sufficient to overcome West's clear first half superior-

De Broughe gave West the edge in ruck and Bray again showed his ability in the heavy going to hold centre half-

back throughout. West today justified the opinion that they would play a strong role in shaping the final four.

Their game against South at Adelaide next week should be a thriller.

South today had to go flat out to take the points from Torrens, inspired by brilliant roving display from Lindsay Head.

The switch of Peter Darley and Roger Howe to half-forward in the last term was decisive.

Woodville played great football to make Sturt struggle to a draw.

A clear win across centre gave the home side a springboard into attack.

The shift of Shearman to the pivot in the third term and Hicks to roving were significant moves by the Blues. It could have been pointers to their line-up for the finals.
