Glenelg came from behind with a strong finishing burst to nose out Norwood by four points when Button goaled in the dying seconds of a gruelling tussle at Adelaide Oval today.

A crowd of 21,000 saw the clash between these unbeaten sides. They expected a thriller and were not disappointed.

They were given a feast of thrilling football played Glenelg 2-4 in an electrifying atmo-sphere in which fortunes fluctuated and ended with

a dynamic climax. Overall, Norwood were the better side and were unfortunate to be defeated. However, Glenelg must be commended on their magnificent fight-back to get up and snatch the game out of the fire.
