



Sturt again at deadliest

After two impressive wins over Port and South, Torrens were brushed aside by an irresistible Sturt and went down by 16 goals at Unley today.

The Eagles were annihilated by a last quarter avalanche in which Sturt kicked 9-8 to 1-5.

The margin was a clear indication of Sturt's superiority on the day, but a demoralised Torrens put up very little resistance in the run home.

The Blues showed just how devastating they can be and their clash against Port at Alberton will be the highlight of next week's split series.

Only in the first quarter today did Torrens play close enough to stop Sturt from breaking into their classic style.


