### DES STAITE RETIRES

Glenelg ruckman, Des Staite, who played in the Seconds today, announced his retirement from football after the game. Staite was vice-captain of Glenelg's league side last year.

Glenelg won an important victory in their bid for the 1968 premiership when they held off Port to win a thriller by one point at Adelaide Oval today.

This success, one the Tigers could not accomplish last year, reduces Port's hold on second place and the double chance to a one-game margin.

However the Magpies' superior percentage means that Glenelg probably will have to win two more games than Port in the run home to take second ranking.

It is possible, but not probable. Victory against Sturt at the Bay next week would certainly bring it closer to the area of probability.

In their only other clash this season, Sturt won at Unley by 11 points.

### Drop rung

West dropped another rung on the ladder as a result.

With seven games remaining there is still a two-game gap between North, in fourth place, and Torrens, fifth.

Although the Bays this week avoided Glenelg Oval like a quicksand, it was on a heavy ground that they outplayed the Blues late last year.

Today Glenelg matched Port's fierce approach with an equal determination to be first to the ball and if not to tackle hard and fast.

This kind of football will reduce the margin of Sturt's superior skill and another thrilling game should result.

Today the Bays had an edge across centre and

in ruck.

At Richmond, South, six goals down at half-time, were lifted to a 10-point win by Peter Darley's magnificent game in ruck.

West on present form look incapable of bridging the gap.

Torrens have to win two games more than North and South with an inferior percentage, probably three.

The Torrens-South clash at Adelaide on Saturday week will be vital.

North with games against Port, Norwood (at Norwood), Glenelg, Torrens, and South in the run to the finals may need all of their present two-game margin to survive.

### Vanquished

As has happened to them before in recent years, North were vanquished by the Blues today in one decisive quarter.

A brilliant first quarter by both sides was followed by a Sturt onslaught of 7.4 to 3 points and the game was won.

The Blues were strong across centre where Shearman played well and Clarke is moving into top gear.

### In trouble

At Elizabeth, Norwood won their third game for the season in the face of spirited opposition from the Bulldogs.

The Redlegs appeared to be in trouble when the home side led by 15 points at half-time, but they made it three out of three in a better second-half.

Bill Wedding's influence early in the game and again in the last quarter emphasised the gap left in the Central Districts side by the injury to Garry Smith.

However, Norwood are improving and it will not be any surprise if, before the season is out, they lower colors other than the Red, White and Blue.

As a result of this game and the one at Richmond, the league commissioners will have their busiest night for a long time next Tuesday.

Six reported players will face the tribunal.

# BAYS HOLD PORT IN FIERCE CLASH

Glenelg played well to hold off Port by one point in a thrilling game at Adelaide Oval today.

The Bays' tackling was fierce and decisive, which did not allow Port to get the ball freely on the move to create openings.

The Bays on the other hand were quicker to recover from just as severe tackling from the Port side.

The game opened at fantastic speed, and both teams showed amazing scoring ability when 10 goals came from 12 shots.

Rosewarne won centre because of his ability to check. On one occasion he got caught before he disposed of the ball, but on the day gave Glenelg

what they were looking for.

Doug Long and Cornes were strong in ruck and only Philp gave them real opposition.

Port never had many brilliant players, but Jeff Potter was best rover afield.

He was in every move Port made early and he won the ball to losing rucks.

Elleway's game all day was sound but his last quarter gave Port the chance to snatch victory.

His strong-marking and clearing dashes in the last term gave Port the opportunity to get back into it.

Port tried Spencer at half-forward then Ebert who did better than his two teammates.

Glenelg made full use of these changes and when Port switched their half-forwards, Glenelg switched half-backs.

Colbey was the player who relished this and as the game progressed he became more prominent.

Newcomer Daryl Blacks won his wing early. A bright aspect of his game was his deep kicks into the forward lines.
