# Double chance safe for Port

Putting a stop to Sturt's winning streak, Port Adelaide today made a virtual certainty of the double chance in this year's major round.

In a typically determined display, the Magpies overcame the late withdrawal of Potter and Yeo to vanguish the Blues.

It was the traditional Port, at their best when the going was hardest as they took control of the game in the third term.

Heavy grounds were the order of the day with conditions deteriorating from half-time onwards.

While Port consolidated their second ranking, Glenelg's second loss straight and West's onepoint win over Torrens has turned attention to a late bid by West to make the four.

The Bays were never in the race against North at Prespect and unless they can lift to a win over South at Adelaide next week, fourth position could well be decided the Glenelg-West clash at the Bay on Saturday week.

#### STRUGGLING

At present West, in fifth place, trail Glenelg by one game but their percentage is superior.

By beating South next week, Glenelg could open up a two-game break on West, who play Port at Richmond.

However, the Bays, without Long and Kerley, are struggling and they have lost their earlier edge across half forward where only Martin has sustained his form.

Today North's half forward line also showed up weaknesses in Glenelg's defence.

The Tigers would still be favorites for the last place in the finals but the manner of their last two matches must have dented their confidence.

North's performance on the other hand was firstclass as the team is generally regarded as better suited to a firm turf and a dry ball.

Their ability in adverse conditions showed them up as a definite threat to Sturt and Port.

Denis Sachse looks a much more confident player than he was in the first half of the season and Peter Anderson's return is giving North progressively more power in ruck.

Port's win was a real triumph for the Magpie spirit and will to win.
