# WEST-GLENELG CLASH VITAL

West Adelaide's dramatic eight-point win over Port at Richmond today has taken the Red and Blacks into fourth place ahead of Glenelg and given next week's clash at the Bay Oval all the tension of a cut-throat semi-final.

Clearly beaten by South, the Bays lost their third game straight to drop out of the four for the first time since the third game of the season.

Glenelg were forced into a series of positional changes as they desperately tried to wrest control of the game from the Panthers, but Darley's power in ruck and the speed of South's small men completed the rout of the Tigers in the last quarter.

Certainly they will not strike anyone of Darley's calibre in ruck but they must be disturbed about deficiencies in defence and across half-forward.

# SOUTH SYSTEM, PACE PERPLEXED BAYS

South produced a fine exhibition of systematic football to easily account for a disappointing Glenelg at Adelaide Oval.

Although Glenelg made a comeback in the third quarter to reduce the leeway to 10 points, South "fired" again in the final term and rained incessant attacks on the goals.

Throughout the game Glenelg had no answer to Darley's magnificent ruckwork and the pace and teamwork of the Panthers in general field

The Panthers relished a relatively firm turf and a dry ball and from the outset moved the ball around with certainty. Players upfield made position well.

Darley's big thump from the opening bounce gave South an immediate lift and set the pattern of things to follow.
