PORT CREEPING UP ON NORTH

West Adelaide's 14-point defeat of North at Adelaide today consolidated West's position in the top four and put North's grip on fourth place in jeopardy.

North are now only one game clear of Port in fifth place and the Red-and-Whites next two games are against Sturt at Prospect and Port at Alberton.

Port today broke a three-game losing streak when they finished two goals up after a great battle against Torrens at Thebarton.

Dittmar's nine goals was the major contribution to Port's win as they kicked their highest score for the season.

The Magpies play Woodville at Woodville next week.

Woodville today recovered from a strong start by the Bays to be

only six points down at half-time.

Craig McKellar showed the benefit of his Carnival experience as he led the Woodville rucks in great style.

Took control

But Woodville's mobility to match Eustice at centre and Fred Phillis' magnificent second half allowed the Bays to take control after half-time to record their tenth straight win—another 50-pointer.

Phillis finished with 10 goals, taking his season tally to 64 and bringing the 100-goal target within comparatively easy range.

However, Woodville's strong first half suggests that Port will have the job in front of them to win next Saturday.

Centrals' commanding third term at Elizabeth left South standing and the Bulldogs coasted to a comfortable win to displace South in eighth position.
