NORTH BACK AS BIG TITLE HOPE

North Adelaide today produced their best form for the season to defeat Sturt in a great game at Prospect and retain their one-game advantage in fourth place on the premiership ladder.

After their poor showing against West last week, North were given little hope of beating the Blues.

For most of the season so far, the Red-and-Whites have been carried by a handful of consistent players, but today's was a real team effort.

Their position changes. Hammond to full back, Robran into ruck, and Wilkey to centre half-forward, all succeeded as North swung into the long-kicking game that has been a characteristic of the side at its best.

Struggling

North's win means that the task ahead of Port to make the four is more difficult.

The two sides meet at Alberton next week in a game that will have the atmosphere and tension of a semi-final.

A win to North would carry them two games plus percentage ahead of the Magpies, and with similar programs after this match, Port would be struggling to make up the leeway.

As expected, Port had to overcome spirited opposition from Woodville

before they took the points at Woodville.

An upset looked a strong possibility when Woodville led by 15 points at half-time.

Position changes by Port in the third term gave them the lift they needed and, with Woodville scoreless for the term, the Magpies made the winning break.

Powerful

Woodville finished the better and only the third quarter lapse cost them the game.

At Richmond West put in a powerful last quarter to win comfortably after Norwood had made a close fight of it for three quarters.

West's small men played an important part in the decisive last quarter.

West moved ahead of Sturt into second place as a result of the Blues' defeat today.

In another important clash next week, the Red and Blacks have the chance to take a strong

grip on second place.

They meet Sturt at Richmond and the prize could well be the double chance in the finals.

In their previous clash, West got in by one point at Unley after a great second half recovery.

At Adelaide Glenelg for the second week straight had to fight off a strong challenge to their unbeaten record.

South today were with the Panthers for three quarters.

The switch of Eustice to half-forward late in the third quarter provided the necessary lift in attack and the Bays' ability to play out the full game saw them well clear at the finish.

However, South's performance after recent lapses was full of merit and more in keeping with the team's real ability.

At Thebarton Torrens returned to winning form in an uninspiring game against Central Districts.

Dogged South shake Bays

After being harassed every inch for three quarters by a strongly determined South, Glenelg ran riot to score convincingly at Adelaide Oval.

The turning point came when Eustice was switched to half-forward late in the third term, seemingly to recover strength after the buffeting he had withstood at the pivot.

After the switch, Eustice kicked three match-winning goals and gave the Bay half-forward line a tremendous lift.

Earlier the Bays had received nothing from this line.

Marker, previously comfortably beaten by Williams, came into the game at mid-field to give Glenelg incessant drive in the final term.

The manner in which South threw themselves into the fray surprised Glenelg, and the Bays were unable to employ their usual flow-on pattern of play.

From the outset the Panthers tackled fiercely and maintained severe pressure to prevent Glenelg breaking clear. The game developed into a battle of defences.

Ruck lift

South's defence, particularly their half-back line, was in complete control until the final term. They harassed Glenelg into making ball handling mistakes.

Nevertheless, Glenelg did adopt a method in attack and, even with a beaten half-forward line, held a slender lead at the final change.

The South half-forward line, with Backman showing the way, troubled Glenelg throughout. Only

the Panthers' lack of method let them down.

For most of the game the Panthers had an edge across centre, as Eustice was the only Glenelg player winning his share of kicks.

South were able to move the ball into their forward area from this ascendancy, but too often they were held up on the last line, where Rowe and Hunt combined extremely well for Glenelg.

Darley opened impressively in ruck, but Kernahan fought back strongly to finish on top.

Kernahan's lift brought Pattinson into the game. Pattinson's drive, particularly in the last half, acted as a dynamo for Glenelg. His pace in the forward area took toll of the South defence.

Constructive

Although Glenelg were being hustled and were unable to set-up a match-winning break, the only time South threatened to take control was midway through the third term.

In this period Backman ran riot to give them a 9-point lead. Backman kicked two quick goals and hit the post with his third effort.

The Bays recovered with a goal from Phillis, the result of constructive football by Kernahan, and another from Eustice. They had won back the initiative.

At three-quarter time it was obvious South were beginning to wane.

and their inability to maintain pressure was evident.

Such was the case in the final term as Glenelg broke into the open and set up a loose man. The previously undaunted South defence went to pieces.

Glenelg's drive came from the rucks and rovers and Marker's penetration from mid-field.

Glenelg finished on, whereas South tired.

It was not surprising, as the Panthers had played well above previous performances. And they were playing against the unbeaten league leaders.

From this point, with Eustice now at half-forward, the Panthers had no answer as Glenelg continued to try and eventually apply their methodical pattern of play.

The previously composed Panther defence was unable to withstand the constant final term barrage and the Bays kicked their way to their eleventh successive victory.

Generally the game was a harder fought, gruelling encounter with no player standing out, but Eustice's serviceable performance at mid-field for three quarters and his match-winning final term earned him the vote for best afield.

For South Byrne turned in a creditable performance in his ruck-roving role, showing undying determination and triggering repeated attacks.

GIVE A THOUGHT TO WAYNE

Goal kicking Fred Phillis is the glamour player at Glenelg—but spare a thought for his younger brother Wayne at centre half-back.

Wayne is a specialist in his job. He is not a dashing, spectacular type but he always keeps pressure on his opponent because he sticks close and seldom makes a mistake.

His height, 6 ft. 2 in., enables him to compete on even terms with almost every centre half-forward but he also has splendid judgment in the air.

He combines strength (almost 14 stone) and dash (when needed) — qualities the Tigers look for in defence.

At Woodville last week Fred kicked 10 goals to take his season's total to 64. Most critics rated him best afield.

Tom Warhurst, however, gave the palm to Wayne Phillis for a great performance at centre half-back.

Wayne, who played his early football at Brighton High School, was promoted from the Thirds to the Seconds in 1967.

He also made two two league appearances that year and added 19 last season in holding the centre half-back position. Fred and Wayne are sons of Fred Phillis who played for West Adelaide in the late 1930's.

An uncle, Don Phillis, was a champion half-forward for North Adelaide in the 1930's.

Although South Adelaide has not been impressive this season, defender Dennis Williams has been effective.

Whether in the back pocket or at half-back he has checked closely and has limited his opponent's chances.

In his first appearance on the flank he received the "run around" from Barrie Barbary (Woodville).

That was a valuable lesson, for he realised that greater concentration and closer application were essential.

Probably his best league performance this season was against West Adelaide when he was named as South's best by one newspaper.

Most pleasing aspect of his game at Elizabeth last week was his improved disposal.

Williams (21, 5.9, 12.0) won South coits and thirds best awards before graduating to seconds and league company.

He made three senior appearances in 1967, 19 last year and has played every match this season.

100 LOOKS IN THE BAG

Glenelg full-forward, Fred Phillis, looks to have the 100 goals this season in the bag, with 64 already and 10 games to go.

But there is a long way to go yet, and yet days, injuries and all sorts of unforeseen circumstances can intervene.

Phillis would be the last to think the century is in the bag. He will take the matches as they come.

North's big full-forward, Dennis Sachse, was the last player to get near the 100, two years ago.

Including the two appearances, Sachse is that they both found it hard to get

In 1967, Sachse kicked 46 goals in the first 10 games, so that Phillis is averaging nearly two more goals a match than did the North forward.

Phillis's match tallies this year have been: South 5, Torrens 4, Sturt 4, Norwood 11, West 4, Woodville 8, North 8, Port 3, Central 7, Woodville 10. Total 64.

One similarity between Phillis and Sachse is that they both found it hard to get

goals against Port full-back Ron Elleway. Sachse kicked two on him, and Phillis this year, three.

In Melbourne this year, Peter Hudson has kicked 65 for Hawthorn and Doug Wade 64 for Geelong.

The last player to kick a century of goals in South Australia was also a Bay player — Colin Churchett.

Churchett bagged 102 in 1951, and 105 in 1950, when Glenelg reached the grand final.
