# EAGLES SPRING SHOCK AT BAY

The end of Glenelg's unbeaten run was the sensation of today's league round when the Tigers went down by 12 points to West Torrens at the Bay.

In their two previous games Glenelg, although winning comfortably in the end, were extended by Woodville and South, and today the Eagles eclipsed their stars to record a great win.

Torrens' skill in the heavy going allowed them to keep Glenelg trailing until the last quarter.

When the Bays did hit the front Head's dominance at centre immediately swung the lead back to Torrens, and they were not headed, again.

"Some of Lindsay Head's greatest football has been played in conditions similar to those prevailing today.

His mastery of the heavy ground and slippery ball cut Ken Eustice out of the game.

Eustice has been the Bays' matchwinner in the two games since the carnival, and his failure to play a dominant role, plus the absence of Kerley's inspiration, brought Glenelg back to the field.

In conditions unfavorable to forwards, Fred Phillis was goalless for the first time this season. Nevertheless, Glenelg had two more scoring

shots than Torrens.

Defeat at this stage will do more good for Glenelg than harm.

Although Glenelg's defeat was the feature of the round, the most significant result was North's defeat of Port at Alberton.

The Magpies dropped to sixth place behind Torrens, and are now two games, plus percentage, out of the four.

Once again Port's inefficiency in attack was costly.

North recovered from a powerful opening by the Magpies and won the game with a great second quarter burst in which they kicked 6-5 to Port's one point.

The Magpies' first term inaccuracy persisted in the third term and North held them scoreless in the last quarter to win convincingly.

Traditionally hard to beat at home, Port's defeat was their fourth at Alberton this season and

the Magpies are faced with the prospect of missing the finals for the first time in 20 years.

In another important result, Sturt regained second position with a convincing win over West at Richmond.

The Blues reorganised their side and were never headed in winning by the biggest margin of the day.

Their clash with the Tigers at Unley next week should draw the season's biggest suburban crowd so far, with Glenelg out to regain their pre-carnival certainty, and Sturt anxious to avenge their resounding defeat at the Tigers hands at the Bay.

At Adelaide Woodville lasted better to win by eight points from South and Centrals opened up a two-game margin over the Panthers by returning to winning form at the expense of Norwood.

# EAGLES PUT END TO LONG BAY RUN

Glenelg's unbeaten run — 11 in a row — came to an end today when the Eagles outplayed them at their own game.

Torrens' teamwork and creative handball in the sloppy conditions were too much for the Bays.

The Eagles got away to a 15-point lead in the first term and held on for the next two terms before finally tying the knot good and tight in the last.

Glenelg hit the front midway through the last term when Marker and Ainsbury goaled. One got the feeling the Bays were going to get out of it and that Torrens were dying on their run.

Head — the cool, finessing Head — lifted the Eagles with his own brilliance and brought other players into the game with his skilful passing to engineer three goals (from the 18 min. mark) in six minutes and Torrens were home.

Where did Torrens win?

They won hands down across centre with Head and Gibson and had Floreani playing a handy role as well.

## Prominent

The Torrens rovers, with Birt very prominent, controlled the fringes handsomely. Gould punched the ball away from Phillis to keep him scoreless and the Torrens defence pressure the Glenelg attack into hurried kicks.

Torrens had players helping out all day, but Glenelg failed in this department.

Torrens delivered the ball accurately to their forwards, while Glenelg placed their forwards at a disadvantage by hurried kicking.

Glenelg's usually immaculate handball deserted them today, while Tor-

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rens were very direct and creative with theirs.

Despite all this, Glenelg had sufficient individuals to keep them going.

Players like Button (23 kicks and nine marks), Marker (21 kicks, 11 when shifted to centre in the last term), and Hamilton either on a flank or at centre half-forward (13 kicks and 11 handballs).

The Eagles took a grip in the first term when they kicked 4-4 to Glenelg's 1-7.

Mulvihill and Tye were busy across half-forward, as were the three rovers, Birt, Barnes, and Phillipou.

Torrens had started with Pill at full forward, changing with Forsyth, and used the three rovers very efficiently.

Glenelg had as much play as Torrens, but were placed under a lot of stress in their forward area and were denied an easy shot, while the Eagles — through some good passing and chest marking — had a good view of the goals.

Hamilton was the Bays only asset up forward going into the second term, and was shifted to centre half-forward where Graham had shut out Moss, while Mulvihill was clutching too many chest marks for Wayne Phillis's liking.

Glenelg outscored Torrens by five points during the second term, and trailed by 10 points at the half-way mark.

Two terrific body

clashes heralded the third session when Phillipou stretched Eustice out from behind in the opening seconds and shortly after Wayne Phillis stopped Floreani head-on as Floreani marked.

Both hurt themselves temporarily.

Gibson put in a tremendous third term on his wing and with Head kicked the Eagles in.

But the Glenelg defence were with it now through Button, Smith, Hunt, and Rowe to offset his play.

Glenelg made changes: Eustice went to a wing, Rosewarne to centre, and when Rosewarne limped off later, Eustice went back to centre, Voigt to a wing and Anesbury came on as a rover.

## Excitement

Only one goal was kicked for the term (by Marker on the gallop), yet the game was full of excitement with good body clashes and flashes of excellent teamwork.

But it was a battle of the defences as the ball travelled for a greater part between the half back lines. It was a fight.

Glenelg started the last quarter four points in arrears and immediately narrowed it to three when Kernahan pointed from a mark deep in a pocket.

Loose checking by the Glenelg defence enabled Phillipou Birt and Tye to mark easily. Tye goaled—dead centre.

# TODAY'S GAMES

## COULD BE EXCITING

If there is a repeat of what happened the last time today's top teams played, today is going to be exciting.

In the second round at Unley this year, West clinched a thriller by beating Sturt by one point in a heart-stopping finish.

Sturt led by five points at the last change, but West came home strongly to win, 13.12 to 13.11.

Best for West were Weideman, Wallis, Juan Hooper, Haupt, Russian and Day.

Best for Sturt included Hicks, Chessell, Nelson, Rigney and Schoff.

Today's return game at Richmond offers all the same potential thrills.

West have won their past two matches well, after recovering after lapses. They have beaten North and Norwood.

Sturt, pressed to the utmost by Norwood and then by going down to North last Saturday, dropped from second to third on the premiership ladder.

West will be battling today to hang on to second place — the valu-

able position which gives teams a second chance in the finals.

Sturt will be trying to regain balance and form, particularly on Trevor Clarke's wing.

The big battle of the day will be between the two biggest — kicking centremen in the league — Robert Day and Bob Shearman. If one of them does not kick a 65-yards goal, the form is not right for this week.

When Port and North met in the second round at Prospect, North led by 15 points at the last change.

But the Magpies fought back to whittle down the margin at the end to seven points.

Port won 8.17 to North's 8.10.

Best for Port came from Salmon, Cahill, Haslam, Nyland and Elix.

North stars were Paull, Lindner, Michael Burns, Barr and Byers.

North last Saturday were impressive in beat-

ing Sturt — more so because they played with team spirit, and came again when Sturt temporarily headed them late in the game.

All North's changes in placings seemed to work, particularly Barrie Robran into ruck and Bob Hammond to full-back.

Actually, of course, Robran and Hammond are such good players they could almost play anywhere.

Port, who also won, could not be quite so happy about their performance against Woodville.

Port had one winning quarter — the third — when they kicked 6.4 to nothing. This won them the game.

For the other three quarters Woodville played far the better football.

Alberton has no terrors for North. They have won there often enough.

If North can reproduce last week's team game they should win.

Glenelg came away strongly from Torrens in the second round at Thebarton to win by 50 points, after being only 10 points ahead at the last change.

Glenelg won 15.14 to 7.12, and the Bays' best came from Kerley, Crabb, Pattinson, Rowe and Colbey.

Torrens were best served by Birt, Forsyth, McSporran, Simmons and Clarke.

Torrens could do no more than win last week, but they were not impressive in a sub-standard game, against Centrals.

By the same token, the edge seems to be slipping off Glenelg's pace.

In their past two games, although they have eventually won well, it has taken them until

the last quarter decisively to throw their opponents, South and Woodville.

The fear at Glenelg is that they may sink into the slumps that cost them a place in the finals last year.

At the present stage, this fear is vague — just a nagging thought.

But how long can a team go unbeaten? And what will happen when the day of defeat arrives?

Glenelg should win today, but not without more nervous thoughts.

Woodville had no trouble with South in the seventh round at Woodville.

Woodville won 16.19 to 8.16. But last week, South proved they can throw off what troubles — if any — they have had internally.

Woodville also showed they are a much-improved side against Port.

The nearness of Woodville to beating Port might prove just the stimulant they need to again beat South today.

In the first encounter, Woodville's best were Huppertz, Blight, McKellar, Barbary and Allen, while South's were Peter Darley, Hodges, Gerald Darley and Coombe.

Norwood definitely look the biggest improvers with two very good

performances in the past fortnight against Sturt and West.

They went down by seven points to Centrals in the seventh round at Norwood, when Centrals won 15.22 to 14.21.

Little more than a goal separated both teams all day in that game.

Best for Centrals were Jackson, Swinstead, Wickham, Farnham and Smitham.

Norwood's best came from Molloy, Poulter, Butchart, Harris and Elliott.

At Elizabeth, Centrals seem to play with more confidence. Even so, this one looks like the Red-legs' second win for the season.

## COULD EQUAL RECORD

Glenelg could equal one club record today, already having broken most of the others.

Should they beat Torrens, it will be their twelfth win this season — all in succession.

This is something the Bays have never done before.

But the win will equal the record they set in 1950 when they won 12 minor round games, and had five losses.

Twelve are the most games Glenelg have won in any season since they entered the League in 1921.

In 1950 they went on to lose to Norwood in the Grand Final.

In their premiership year (1934) Glenelg won 10, lost six, and drew one match.

The drawn match was against North and the scores were North 15.11, Glenelg 14.17.

It was an extraordinary season for Glenelg and Port.

In the third round of the year, Port annihilated Glenelg 33.19 to 12.14, when Jack Pridoux kicked 11 goals for Port.

After the seventh series, Glenelg were bottom on the premiership ladder, with Port just above them.

Port drew their match against West at Wayville Showgrounds when the scores were 19.17 each.

At the end of the minor round, the final four were Port, Glenelg, Torrens and Sturt — all with 10 wins each, but Port and Glenelg took first and second positions by virtue of the one point they each received for the drawn games.

Sturt beat Torrens in the first semi-final, and Port hammered Glenelg in the second semi-final, 23.21 to 13.16.

Glenelg went on to beat Sturt by 13 points

in the preliminary final, 12.11 to 9.16.

Then came the big boil-over in the grand final.

Port, because of their win by nearly 11 goals in the second semi-final, were raging hot favourites.

But they were beaten by nine points. Final scores were Glenelg 18.15; Port 16.18.

The Glenelg hero was G. B. (Blue) Johnstone who took a towering mark with minutes to go, and goaled.

The great Jack Owens, a fine left-foot kick full-forward, was captain of Glenelg.

But, contrary to expectations, he began the game in a forward pocket.

Owens kick 73 goals for Glenelg that year.

Owens played 177 games from 1924 to 1935, and kicked a total of 827 goals.

## AMONG THE PLAYERS

### 'TEASER' JUST MISSED

Woodville captain-coach Noel Teasdale was NOT missed, but then JUST missed, against Port last Saturday.

Port ruckman Keith Spencer came through hard, and up-ended Teasdale with a perfectly fair shirt-front bump.

Teasdale got up quickly, but like a ram-paging lion.

The first Port guernsey he saw coming towards him was Port half-back Dennis Errey.

Errey and Woodville half-forward John Cummins were battling for the ball, hip to hip, with Cummins just a fraction in front.

Teasdale went to meet Errey with a shirt-front, but because Cummins was partly across Errey's body, Teasdale only half-collected his target.

Lucky for Dennis.

Either Port half-forward Peter Yeo has been practising his kicking, or one he got away was a fluke last week against Woodville.

Yeo grabbed the ball about half-forward on the Woodville grandstand wing. He slammed through a goal, and the ball must have travelled at least 60 yards.

Yeo is not noted as a long kick, but this one was certainly a beauty.

Actually, Yeo looked quite at home when he took over a wing after Peter Fletcher went to half-back.

The leading league goalkickers are: Fred Phillis (Glenelg), 68;

When a team has a run of wins like Glenelg have this season, argument usually starts about the longest winning sequence.

Port are the only team to have gone through the minor round unbeaten. They did this in 1914, when they won the premiership.

But Port have also gone close to remaining unbeaten.

In 1951, 1956 and 1959 they lost only one game each season, winning 17 others in the minor round.

Each time they went top.

The total attendance at the end of last week's eleventh round was 496,575.

At this time last year it was 500,214.

Five years ago when Central District and Woodville were admitted to the competition, the total after 11 rounds was 470,738.



## SLOW PROGRESS FOR GOULD

At this stage three seasons ago, "Joey" Gould had played 84 league games; now he has played 86.

That briefly tells the story of his setbacks because of injury and in-different form which restricted him to six games in 1967, one last year and one this season.

Gould made his "come-back" last week in an unaccustomed full-back role, after a brief trial in that position with the Seconds.

Although not under intense pressure against Central District last week he did sufficient to suggest that he could succeed as a goalkeeper.

If he is at full-back today, he will certainly be put to the test against S.A. and Glenelg full forward Fred Phillis, who is dangerous in man-to-man tussles and an even bigger threat if given any latitude.

As a star centreman for Torpena in the Mid-South-East Association, Gould almost became a Redieg.

He was only 16 when he played in a Norwood trial. He was not under notice and returned to the country disillusioned about the "city".

A couple of years later he joined West Torrens. Since 1962 he has played mainly on a half-forward flank, at centre, and occasionally at centre half-forward.

Gould, who has an ambition to play 100 league games, admits he is a slow starter each season.

After poor displays in the trials in 1966 he began as a league reserve; with similar in-different form in 1967, he started with the Seconds.

Four years ago in a pre-season trial at Glenelg, Laurie Rosewarne impressed at centre as he repeatedly drove the ball in to full forward Kevin Rowe.

Nowadays Rosewarne, playing on the wing, looks to Rowe at full-back to drive the ball out to him with long kicks.

Rosewarne, centre-man for Glenelg Thirds in 1964, played 12 league games in 1965, 12 in 1966, 21 in 1967 and 20 last year.

Whether at centre or on the wing he is a quiet unobtrusive player—one who may not figure in the limelight yet is highly regarded at the Bay because of his effective football.

His ability to get ball to boot with a minimum of fuss or flurry is one of his strongest attributes.

He is one of the most-travelled players in league football, making a weekly air trip from Whyalla to represent the Tigers.

Rosewarne, (22, 5.10½, 12.0) is a son of Clem Rosewarne, one of the top forwards of the 1930's.
