Only eight points up at three-quarter time, and coming home with the wind in their face, the Tigers looked beaten.

But Centrals folded, and the Tigers fought tooth and nail to hold on in a good last term.

The Bays' early season strongpoint—their half-forward line—was not very operational today.

Marker (still carrying a back injury) was beaten by Nicks; Long had little influence at centre half-forward, and Button was the only one

to give any drive at all.
