BAYS HIT BACK LIKE CHAMPIONS

League leader Glenelg, pulling out of their post-carnival slump, reasserted their right to top place on the premiership ladder with a convincing win over North at Prospect today.

North, battling to hold their place in the four, started solid favorites but were brushed aside in a commanding third quarter by the Tigers.

North's defeat, their first in seven games, leaves them open to Torrens' great bid to make the major round.

The Eagles were far too good for the improving Redlegs at Norwood. Birt and Head led Torrens to a 40-point win after the Eagles had gone 63 points clear at the last change.

ONE GAME

Torreans in fifth place are still one game behind West and North but their big win has reduced their percentage deficit.

West struggled to an eight-point win over Centra. Districts at Eliza-

both and at this stage do not look a premier-ship threat.

Torreans, on the other hand, with wins over top four teams Glenelg, Sturt, and West in their seven game winning streak, are moving like real title contenders.

In a fortnight's time, the Eagles have the chance to make it four wins out of four against the team now in the leading division.

Their game against North at Thebarton on August 23 will probably decided which goes into the first semi-final.

Sturt took a strong grip on second position when they outclassed Port at Unley.

The Blues reorganised side worked smoothly with Bob Shearman's eclipse of John Cahill at centre a big factor in the victory.

At Adelaide Woodville kicked the highest score of the day to win by 27 points after South had headed them at half-time.

Fine weather and the intensifying battle for a place in the four gave attendances a lift, this should be maintained as Torrens fight their way upward.

Umpire Hall was in control before an opening crowd of about 12,000.

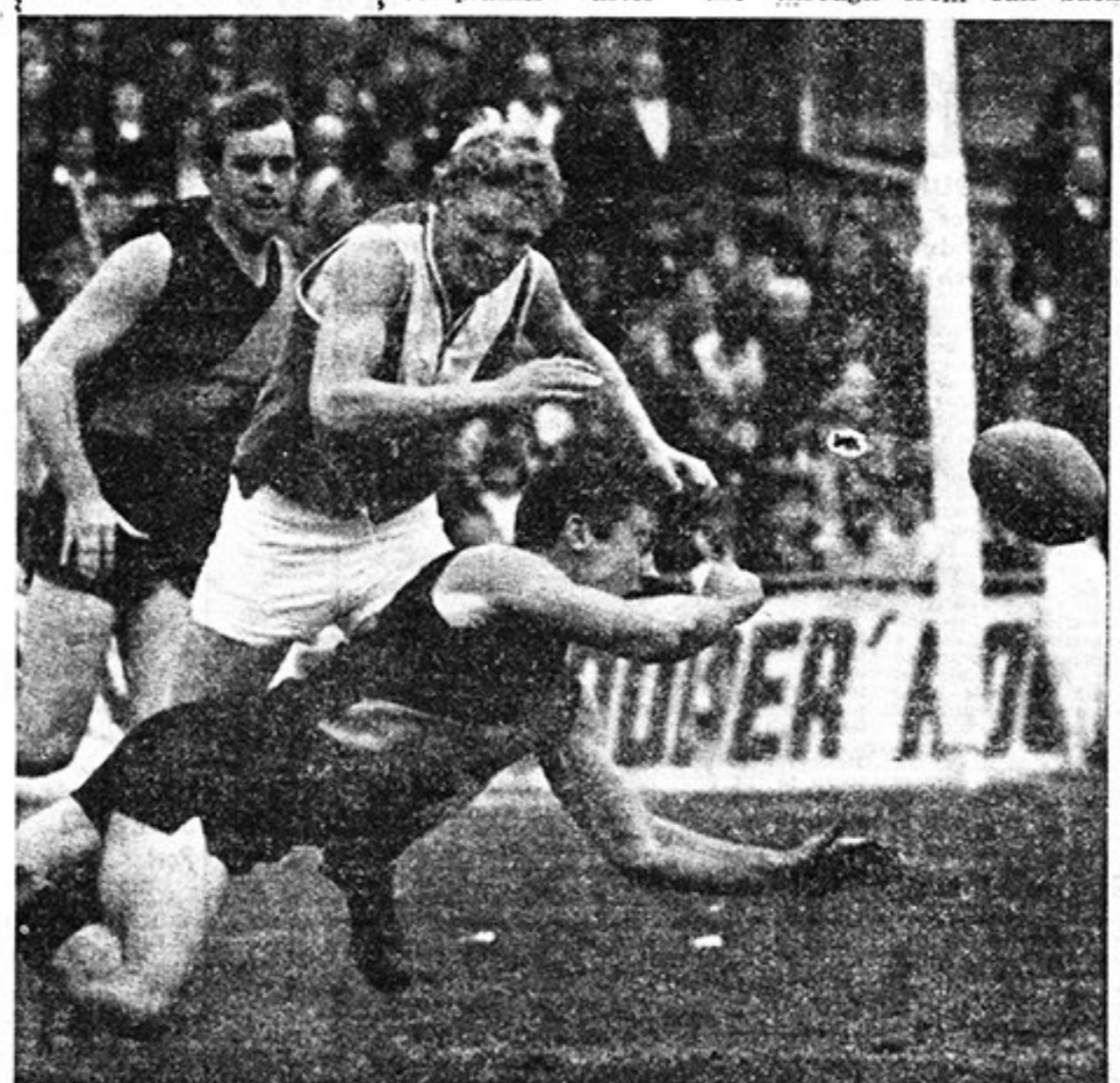
Glenelg opened with Kernahan and Cornes in the first ruck, opposed to Anderson and Jaworskyj.

Goal for goal

Robran came into the game during this burst. Kernahan and Long, at full back, held the fort for Glenelg early in the second quarter.

The second quarter was a repetition of the first, with goal-for-goal the pattern.

Phillis was still the focal point of Glenelg attacks.

North were reaching half-forward often enough but had nobody running through to capitalize on the Glenelg half-back line tactics of punching away.

It was tough finals football with neither side giving an inch at this stage.

The scores were level at half-time.

The big swing in the game came 10 minutes into the third quarter.

Wayne Phillis and Long blocked off North's direct route to goal.

Glenelg's tenth goal was the goal of the match.

Eustice, Pattinson, and Marker combined magnificently for State full forward Phillis to goal on the run.

Glenelg went on to attack incessantly for a further two goals four behinds without answer from the home side.

Some heart

North were still 34 points down at the 18-minute mark.
