It was 11 minutes into the third quarter of the Glenelg-South game.

Seconds before the crowd of more than 9,000 people had roared approval as Phillis chest-marked a 30-yard pass from his captaincoach, Neil Kerley.

Now the crowd was hushed. Phillis was only 35 to

40 yards out from goal. He was on about a 45-degree angle on the grandstand flank. Glenelg were kicking to the northern end.

Carefully and delib-erately, Phillis studied the ball, the goalposts, and then the ball again.

The crowd remained silent.

Phillis ran up, his left foot swung through the ball, and it split the centre of the goals. It never looked like missing.

Glenelg Oval erupted. their foundations.

The crowd went wild.

He'd done it. Amid prolonged applause, cheering, and screaming, hundreds of schoolboys and older youth invaded ground.

Their target: Phillis. A voice came over the public address: "Would all spectators please keep off the oval." It was ignored.

Glenelg ruckman Graham Cornes practically did a cart-wheel before jumping all over his goal-kicking teammates.
