BAYS SET PACE: THREE BIG WINS

Glenelg today maintained their unbeaten record when they out-classed 1968 premiers Sturt to win by 59 points at the Bay.

The Tigers, with winning margins of 55 and 50 points in their two previous games, retained top ranking by percentage over West, also unbeaten so far.

West shook themselves clear of a determined Woodville in the second term at Richmond and went right away in the last to double Woodville's score.

In a low-scoring defensive game at Alberton, Port made better use of the breeze to win comfortably by 34 points.

At Elizabeth, North returned to winning form when they outclassed Centrals for three quarters and finished 46 points clear.

Norwood provided the upset of the day by kicking the highest score of the series against Torrens at Adelaide Oval.

The Redlegs had a heartening 37-point win.

Although Sturt's strength was drastically reduced by injury today, it seems clear that the Blues' permanent losses from last season have brought them back to the field.

Blues' losses

The competition promises to be more even than for many years, with Glenelg and West followed by Port with two wins and the rest all

having won one game.

In defeating Sturt, Glenelg showed the same brand of determination and teamwork that has brushed aside the opposition in their two previous games.

Kernahan again showed out as a valuable addition to last year's strength and Ken Eustice in beating Shearman at centre, appears to be getting back into top form.

The Panthers backed up strongly and used handball with telling effect as they took complete control after half time.

Port's new players, Grimm and Dittmar, were again prominent in the game against South at Alberton.

The Panthers lost the game in the first quarter when they had the breeze but led by only a point at the change.

Ebert's success at centre half-forward was an important contribution to the Magpies' win.

For three quarters at Elizabeth, North showed something like the form supporters have been looking for.

Their reorganised ruck was a success, and they had control in most of the key positions.

The only disturbing feature from North's point of view was a poor last quarter.

The Red-and-Whites will need to correct this tendency to fall away at the end of a game.

A powerful second quarter established West's ascendancy over Woodville and the Red and Blacks go to Prospect next week determined to make it three out of four against last year's other finalists.

The 1968 grand finalists Port and Sturt meet on Anzac Day with the Blues only a shadow of their former strength.

The return of injured players Schoff and Bagshaw will have a big influence on the Blues' performance, but at this stage the Magpies look the safer bet.

Norwood's win over Torrens gave the Red-legs' supporters their biggest thrill for a long time.

Gaining confidence after going stride for stride with the Eagles in the first half, Norwood showed far superior teamwork.

In a high scoring game a dashing display at half-forward by Nygaard, and a promising game on the other flank by newcomer Pettingill were features.

STABKICKS

Where are all West Adelaide's supporters? This is the question being asked down Richmond way.

West has won three matches straight, beaten the two teams which played in the grand final last year, yet only 3,646 people were at Richmond today.

For years West have been a great team, produced many good footballers, and played in many grand finals since the war, yet their supporters are getting less. Why?

THE wire mesh screens behind the goals at either end of Alberton Oval today did produce two noteworthy features. No streamers and paper littered the kick-off areas and, in fact, one end was practically devoid of spectators.

Both cheer squads — usually seen in this area — went elsewhere.

LONG, immaculate, and balanced kicking seemed to be a thing of the past but it was well revived at Elizabeth Oval.

One such kick — as that of North's Hammond who sank a goal from well

over half-forward, all of 70 yards.

NATIONAL Serviceman

Graham Cornes received an ovation from the receptive Glenelg crowd when he went on in the last quarter against Sturt.

Glenelg fans, mostly female, mobbed and kissed Cornes in film-star style after the match.

St. Georges Australian rules team in Sydney has offered to transport Cornes to and from Holdsworth camp just to have the pleasure of a league footballer training with them.

LINDSAY Head's snap for a goal early in the second quarter was a typical display of skill by the Torrens veteran.

The ball was bounced in the square after Norwood full back Dean Sutter had run over the line. Head gathered the ball on an almost impossible angle and calmly snapped over his shoulder for full points.

TIGERS MUCH TOO RUGGED FOR FRAIL STURT

The Tigers' tough, spirited approach, and superior field marking wore down and crushed a weakened, frail-looking Sturt at Glenelg.

After a tough, quick-tackling first half, the Bays only allowed Sturt 2-4 and added 9-11 themselves to win easily.

The late withdrawal of Bagshaw added to Sturt's pre-match worries, and their performance today bore out coach Jack Oatey's pre-season warning to Sturt that they could not expect the same easy road as in past seasons.

The crowd of 15,743 saw Kerley win the toss and kick with the breeze to the northern end.

The Bays got away to a bad start when Button gave away a stupid free to Chessell, who made no mistake.

Stuck close

Button received a full blast from coach Kerley.

Fred Phillis was in the first three Glenelg goals. He fisted the first out to Kerley and then marked strongly for two himself.

The Bays were winning across centre, with Eustice beating Shearman, and with Crabb and Rosewarne playing very close to Clarke and Hicks.

But from 10 shots Glenelg could only manage three goals. Their string of five behinds late in the first term looked ominous.

Kernahan was rucking intelligently for Glenelg, with Chessell doing likewise for Sturt. But they rarely clashed.

Kerley was in everything for Glenelg, with Pattinson and Voigt getting more of the ball than Zoanetti and Endersbee.

Endersbee got hold of the ball often enough today, but the quick, strong tackling of Glenelg prevented him from doing much with it.

Both sides settled down to slog it out in the second quarter, and although the difference was only nine points at half-time, the Bays had developed their long hand-ball.

Only the bad tactics of playing the outer flank

too much, and fine defence by Jarrett and his co-defenders prevented Glenelg going right away.

Best term

Glenelg would not let Sturt get their renowned system working, and some of the Sturt replacements just were not good enough.

Glenelg kept pushing the ball in high to Phillis, and Jarrett did well to hold him to only two goals up to three-quarter time.

Glenelg's third quarter was their best as Kernahan started to dominate the throw-ins.

Kernahan's ruck work in this term gave the fast-moving Glenelg forwards an armchair ride.

Jack Oatey switched Greenslade to centre, Shearman to half-forward, and Burgan to full forward, but to no avail.

Colbey had a brilliant third quarter, coming up with great dash to the ball.

Confidence

Two of Colbey's clearing kicks from behind centre were marked by Kernahan less than 30 yards from Glenelg's goal.

Glenelg finished full of confidence in the last quarter, adding 5-5 into the dying breeze.

Sturt's Greenslade managed two goals from isolated attacks as the Tigers drove in with their tails up.

Glenelg have developed a long attacking handball game since last year, and today used this with telling effect later in the game.

In a side that had no passengers, the three "old men" of the team—Kernahan, Kerley, and Eustice—played as well and looked as fit as any of the youngsters.

Tight line

The Bay half-back line was tight and well led by Wayne Phillis.

Both Kerley and Button supported this line well with strong marking and shepherding.

Fred Phillis is the big man that makes all Glenelg's hard work worthwhile, and with four goals again today and a lot of good shepherding he was again a key player.

The Sturt story is a sad one. It was hard to pick a four-quarter win-

ner.

Certainly they missed Schoff, Rigney, and Bagshaw, but there is some coaching and patience required at Unley this year.

It was a big effort from Glenelg and will do wonders for a more confident approach from the Tigers.

Perhaps we will see Kerley let Glenelg off the chain and go on with the exuberant approach we saw in the last quarter today.

OPPOSING ruckmen Ted Banks (Sturt) and Harry Kernahan (Glenelg) clash on the goal-line at the Bay today. Both are unsighted and it appears that the ball is going to hit the post.

TODAY'S GAMES

Port, favoured to beat South today at Alberton, were similarly regarded as good things when they met South in the fifth round at Adelaide last year.

But South beat them by six points.

Port were the only ones last year of the teams opposed today to lose a match to their rivals.

West beat Woodville three times, and North, Torrens and Sturt all beat Centrals, Norwood and Glenelg twice respectively.

West beat Woodville 16.16 to 6.10 in the second round last year. Sims (six goals), Panenburgh, Juan Hooper and Hughes all did well, while Woodville's best were Kneebone, Reeves, Simonsen and Teasdale.

In the sixth round, West won 13.13 to 4.8.

Woodville put on their best effort in the 14th round, but still failed by 16 points—West 10.17, Woodville 9.7.

West's best were Fraser, Hooper, Bertlesmeier and Loveday, while McKellar, Syvertsen, Teasdale and Kneebone shone for Woodville.

West today are unlikely to let slip the chance to remain unchallenged at the top of the premiership ladder, and should win well.

Glenelg twice made

Sturt go flat out last year, although beaten each time. In the second round they lost by 11 points—14.12 to 13.7.

Best for Sturt were Murphy, Jones (seven goals), Adcock, Halbert and Clarkson, while Marker, Fitzgerald, Paech and Kerley did well for the Bays.

At Glenelg in the 14th round, Sturt won by one point, 13.13 to 13.12. Their best were Jarrett, Burgan, Hicks and Chesell, and Glenelg's were Cornes, Rosewarne, Knill and Doug Long.

Today's game at the Bay promises to be another such thriller, with nothing between the teams.

Glenelg's determination, stronger rucks and rovers could turn the game in their favour.

Neil Kerley was in great form last week, and a reproduction will make him a stumbling block for Sturt, who have lost a valuable rover in Roger Rigney.

And they are without Tony Clarkson in ruck this time.

Torrens, although they won twice, did not find Norwood easy last year.

In the second round, they won 13.17 to 11.6, with Lipp, Birt, Head, Forsyth and Tye contributing most. Best for Norwood were Porritt, Inglis, Wedding and Kuchel.

They have lost Inglis and Wedding now.

In the 14th round, Torrens again won by about the same margin, 14.20 to 11.12. Birt, Bills, Mulvihill and Tye were their best, with Peter Oatey, Inglis, Molloy and Harris best for the Redlegs.

Norwood lack the ability to apply heavy pressure such as Glenelg did last week, and Torrens should again emerge winners.

MAGNIFICENT CONTROL

Glenelg follower Ray Button showed the value of being able to kick powerfully and accurately at Thebarton against Torrens.

Button marked well in the backlines. Glenelg were kicking with the wind.

A group of half-dozen Torrens and Glenelg players gathered just past centre, to meet Button's expected kick.

Glenelg ruckman Harry Kernahan, however, dropped about seven yards behind the pack. Button saw him there.

With a beautifully controlled 60 yard drop kick, Button lobbed the ball over the pack's head, right into Kernahan's hands.

Kernahan quickly handpassed on to a teammate and it looked as if Glenelg were set up

for an easy goal.

But one of their forwards fumbled, and Torrens were able to nip in and clear.

Button, who missed almost all of last season, showed he is well on the way back to top form. He marked strongly and kicked well.

Glenelg full-forward Fred Phillis was another Bay player to control a kick beautifully.

In the third quarter, Phillis marked about 50 yards out, when Glenelg were against the wind. He was in the right forward pocket, the 'wrong' side for a left-footer.

Phillis took careful aim, and made allowance for the strong wind. At first it looked as if his shot would go out of bounds.

But once the wind caught it, the ball floated in curvingly, and hit the goalpost. Two more inches and it would have been a perfectly-judged goal.

Phillis has got over his earlier kicking horrors. He is now putting the goals through with a straight line drop-kick which hardly ever looks like missing.

He kicked four, but

should have had six against Torrens.

He is such a strong mark, it is mainly a matter of Glenelg delivering the ball well to him in the air.

Leading league goal-kickers are—

D. Phillis (Glenelg), 9; M. Greenslade (Sturt), 8; K. Pattinson (Glenelg), R. Oatey (Norwood), L. Backman (South), D. Jones (West), all 7; M. Dittmar (Port), J. Tillbrook (Sturt) and B. Hearl (North), all 6.

Attendance of 41,455 at last Saturday's games took the season total to 102,557, against 97,134 last year.

Sturt still had the chance to beat West in the thrilling finish at Unley last week, when West won by one point.

There was at least a minute to go when Sturt half-forward John Tilbrook grabbed the ball.

It would have been an easy 40 yarder for Tilbrook normally, but for some reason he fook off, and half grubbed his kick.

Thus went Sturt's last chance of winning.

BURGAN A YOUNG "VETERAN"

Versatility is the keynote at Unley — and new Sturt half-forward Tony Burgan fits the bill.

Although primarily a half-forward, he has also played with distinction at half-back, when used in an emergency, and at centre wing.

The word "new" may seem a little astray because Burgan is now in his third season.

But he has been nursed along as a gap-plugger by the Sturt selectors for the day when a vacancy would occur — and 1969 has given him the chance to consolidate his position.

In 1967 he was still eligible for Colts football but he was given a grounding in the Seconds.

When the State team was in Perth in July, he was promoted to league ranks for the first time, at the tender age of 17.

That display was sufficient to convince the selectors that he was

ready for league football although he lost his place the following week with the return of eight State members.

Injuries caused a team reshuffle on August 5 — and Burgan was promoted again.

So coolly and efficiently did he handle half-forward that he was named second best afield by one newspaper.

Last year he was credited with 15 games (seven as a reserve) but he gained valuable experience.

Burgan, who turned 19 on March 28, celebrated his birthday with an impressive game against Perth the following day.

He was quiet in the S.A. opening against North Adelaide, won his position for the first half against West Adelaide last week and was then

subdued by Rodney Pope.

★ ★ ★

Glenelg half-back Chris Hunt, 26, has made a successful return to league football as a back pocket.

Although not conspicuous in the opening series, he was among the best last week against West Torrens with a lively display.

Hunt, winner of the Tomkins Medal for the best and fairest in the Thirds in 1960, was a league regular at half-back until he accepted a coaching appointment at Port Augusta in 1966.

Three years in the northern seaport did not impair his judgment.

Now, having played 92 league games, he is well on the way to his century but a long way short of the 206 games (a club record) played by his father Ray Hunt.
