With an exhibition of powerful, cohesive football Glenelg took control from the outset to completely outclass a disappointing Woodville at Glenelg Oval today.



Their half-forward line was always on top with Moss acting as a trafficcop in the key position and Marker and Hamilton displaying a com-bination of pace, strong marking and handball.

The crippling factor from a Woodville point of view was the dan-gerous Phillis at the goalfront.
