BAYS—BUT THEY HAD TO BATTLE

In a game with the atmosphere and tension of a grand final, Glenelg today maintained their unbeaten run when they withstood a typically determined challenge by Port at Alberton to win by seven points.

The Magpies, whose form this season has been well below their normal high standard, displayed to the full the tremendous fighting spirit that has characterised their post-war football.

But Glenelg prevailed and in doing so proved themselves against the toughest of opposition.

It has become traditional that Port at Alberton are the real test of a team's quality and the Bays came through the test with their stature undiminished.

They must have gained far more satisfaction from this result than from any of their 50-point plus victories in the previous seven games.

The defences of both teams were on top for most of the day with the Bays' greater penetration from half-back and Kernahan's influence in ruck in the third quarter particularly being decisive in Glenelg's favor.

The Tigers riding high two games plus percentage clear at the top of the premiership ladder now have a comparatively easy program until they meet Sturt at Unley on July 12.

Port, on the other hand, now face up to Sturt at Alberton and defeat in this game could leave them three games out of the four.

They would then be confronted with the task of winning probably eight of the remaining 11 games to make the finals. On today's form this is not beyond them, but can the Magpies sustain the resolution that today pushed Glenelg to the limit?

Next Saturday's clash against Sturt at Alberton will attract another big crowd.

The Blues won comfortably from Woodville today but the visitors' quick tackling unsettled Sturt early and they found gaps in the home team's defence in a last quarter bid.

Bagshaw and Shearman were the prime movers in Sturt's win.

At Richmond, third ranked West struggled all day to get in by 15 points over Central Districts, in ninth position.

The Bulldogs led until the last quarter, when Day took control at the pivot.

Another top four team, North Adelaide, also struck trouble when South led them by five goals at the end of the first quarter at Prospect.

Peter Darley showed glimpses of his best but North recovered well in the second term and finished with a commanding 6-7 in the last quarter.

At Thebarton, Norwood took an 11-goal hammering from the Eagles and that was the tally of Torrens' full forward Brian Mulvihill.

The Eagles have the chance to bridge the gap separating them from the leaders when they meet North at Prospect next week.

BAYS STAVE OFF VALIANT PORT BID

Glenelg maintained their unbeaten run by holding off a determined Port Adelaide in a magnificent game at Alberton Oval today.

The good crowd of 17,975 received value plus in witnessing a feast of pressure football. The result was in doubt until the final siren.

From the outset the game developed into a ruthless, tight encounter. There was no room for the faint hearted.

Port, in their traditional manner, applied severe pressure, particularly with fierce tackling, and Glenelg were never allowed to employ the method in their forward area that has resulted in their recent big wins.

Glenelg were never allowed to break clear of packs and were never

given the luxury of balanced kicking.

Neither side was able to set up any complete ascendancy in the first half.

Milde matched the Glenelg ruck strength to give the Magpies equal opportunities.

After half-time Kernahan took charge of this department, bringing Pattinson and Anesbury into the game and the Bays temporarily threatened to take control.

The Magpie defence, capably led by Obst, withstood the onslaught and their efforts kept Port within touch.

The switch of Spencer into ruck in the last quarter lifted Port.

And with an edge across centre the Magpies enjoyed most of the attacking.

Glenelg were held scoreless in this term until the 22-minute mark when Moss kicked a point from a free for deliberately kicking out of bounds against Elleway.

Port did not have anyone ahead of centre capable of finishing off their attacks, and too often the Bay defence turned them out with ridiculous ease.

There is no doubt that Glenelg's defence saved the day for them. The half-back line was particularly dominant.

The Bay defence took everything in their stride throughout, marking strongly, offering tandem support to use creative handball and generating good rebound in forming a formidable unit.

Colbey, W. Phillis, and Smith, Glenelg's half-backs, were always in command and repeatedly rebounded to Moss—the figurehead of the Glenelg attack.

The Port defence also was on top but they did not gain the same rebound.

Even Obst's kicking depth only moved the ball to the centreline.

The only thorn in the Magpie defence was Moss. He realised he could win the umpire's whistle by playing for free kicks and this he did to perfection.

Particularly in the third quarter he received a feast and was instrumental in giving the Bays their match winning 18-point lead at the last change.

The impeccable performance of Obst in defence for Port won him the vote for best afield.

His form was in line with that which won him his Magarey Medal.

It would be splitting hairs to separate Kernahan and Colbey as best for Glenelg.

Kernahan overcame the resistance offered by Milde, to take charge of the rucks and set the Bays on a winning path.

Colbey, in his usual ruthless manner, was impassable all day, displaying strong marking, penetrating disposal and backing up to spark attacks.
