mittee ruled Carman eligible to play on Friday night—on a technicality. His application had not been sent back to the SA league from the Victorian Football League

within the requisite 31 days. Norwood and Carman were involved with three bodies in the application for his clearance.

Hours after watching North's romp to victory over Torrens at Prospect, Sunday Mail writer Bill Henderson was still enthusing over the league debut of Rodney Robran.
