Port finally shook off Glenelg in the last half in a tight, hard-fought game at Alberton Oval today.

Many changes were made by both teams to counter the opposition's strong points.

Port finally came out on top. In the last term they moved Ebert to full forward and Freeman to centre half-forward.

There were many interesting duels during the day with Port again coming out on top in most of the big clashes. Glenelg tried both Marker and Eustice on the determined John Cahill, but the Port centre man outclassed them.

Port opened the second half playing Woite at half-forward. He quickly kicked three goals and showed clear signs of winning his position.

But the Bays switched Colby over to stem the flow of play from Woite.

The clash between Freeman and Caldwell was another highlight, with Freeman failing badly scoring 1-6 in the first term.

and they were lucky to leave the field at half-time only four points down.

Port's third term set a pattern for their win, although they were only six points up at the last break.

The move of Woite in the third term was countered by Glenelg, but they could not counter one switch that finally allowed Port to take out the game.

The switch of Ebert and Freeman was the move that led to the Bays' defeat.

Glenelg stemmed Cahill slightly by placing Eustice on him, but Freeman still won the ball to drive it into Ebert.

Caldwell, who had played well on Freeman, could not muster enough strength to hold Ebert who bagged four goals for the term.

Gave drive

Port players were fairly even today, but no one played as consistently for four terms as did their skipper John Cahill at centre. Both Marker and

Eustice were matched against Cahill, but on all occasions he won to give Port drive.

Potter and Haslam roved well.

Potter was more solid in defence than Haslam, who is a more attacking rover.

Trevor Obst was back to his best form to assist Elleway, while Denis Errey and Clayton were strong across half back.

Port's star forwards Woite, Freeman, and Ebert, all had their moments.

Although Freeman won the ball more consistently on the day, his kicking let him down.

Glenelg today found another young half forward flanker in Osborn.

He replaced Fitzgerald early in the first term and immediately got into the game to drive Glenelg into attack.

Caldwell played well on Freeman for three terms.

Hockridge and Goldfinch both rucked well, with Hockridge doing more around the ground.

Terror tactics

Norwood came within an ace of causing the upset of the season by defeating Sturt today.

But the Blues, as always, steadied under pressure.

And, believe me, when they play Port again they'll know the pressure is on and will have to earn every kick — and they'll earn some they won't get.

That's how it was today. Port beat Glenelg at Alberton and beat them well.

And they did it with the tactics we have seen from Port through the years.

The heavy unloading of Eustice three times after disposal, the knees that keep an opponent on the ground after he has been given a free, the body clash two seconds too late when the other man is marking—these incidents were strongly evident today.

Not a major factor in the result—but this sort of thing keeps a man looking over his shoulder.

Nuff said. With an umpire using the velvet glove rather than the iron hand, Port got away with it.

Some people say I'm always getting the ump. I'm sure Foster will have no criticism of umpire Ron Daniels' performance today.

Glenelg coach Neil Kerley had the right tactics today in setting out to check Peter Woite's brilliance.

The Port centre half-forward was dangerous from the start, breaking away from Moss repeatedly and creating opportunities for the forwards.

Moss got the message from Kerley and checked more closely.

Fos Williams switched Woite to a half-forward flank and he immediately kicked three goals on Ken Smith.

When Colbey was put on Woite he cut him out of the game.

This Port lad has too much talent to be subdued for four quarters but a coach who sees he is closely checked need never be afraid of Woite again.
