The other members will be appointed by SANFL president, Mr. D. M. Brebner.


In addition to this, Norwood will make their own representations to Collingwood.

SAM GALLAGHER SUMS UP . . .

West Torrens' runaway victory over Woodville in foday's league football—their fourth straight win—means they are only one game out of the four.

A record crowd at Woodville saw a disappointing game by the home side.

In comparison, the Eagles were brilliant as they raced to a lead of nearly 16 goals before Woodville saved some face with three late goals.

But Torrens' program for the next five weeks could not be harder.

They are drawn against each of the five teams at present above them on the premiership ladder.

Three at home

But three of the games are at Thebarton and one is at Adelaide. Nevertheless, they will need to produce something out of the box to survive this stretch without mishap.

League leaders Sturt equalled Glenelg's 1969 11-game winning sequence when they ironically downed the Tigers by 31 points at the Bay.

A Glenelg victory looked a possibility in the dull first half.

On the day however, a strong all-round performance by the Sturt rucks and Mick Nunan's creative roving carried the Blues to a clear win.

Norwood

Norwood drew to within a percentage margin of the top four when they survived a strong recovery by South in the closest game of the day at Adelaide.

Eagles have one to go

Their further progress seems barred by Port (at Adelaide) and North (at Norwood) over the next two weeks.

The North-Port clash at Prospect next week is North's chance to consolidate third place and give themselves a double chance.

Since their defeat by West on May 23, the Red-and-Whites have come right back.
