North resist threat

Reacting strongly to the challenge to their place in the top four, Adelaide North molished up-and-coming West Torrens with a devastating third quarter at Thebarton today.

North's convincing win and a similarly impressive display Glenelg against Woodville opened up a one game break betweeen fourth and fifth position.

The gap could be widened next week with North and Glenelg drawn against Norwood and West.

However, neither West nor Norwood was dis-graced in defeat today by the league leaders, Sturt and Port.

Sturt struggled all day in the heavy conditions at Unley before retaining their unbeaten record.

They had nearly twice as many scoring shots as West, but fell again into the inaccuracy which plagued them earlier in the season.

West's forward work was not much better as they kicked only four points in the second half.

Bob Day, at centre. was in brilliant form for West, while Rick Schoff in his return to the Sturt side was out of touch.

At Adelaide, Norwood were outplayed by Port for three quarters, but the Redlegs staged a thrilling last term recovery to put the Magpies under severe pres-sure in the closing stages.

The Redlegs failed badly at half-forward and it would not surprise if Wynne in fine form at full back today, is switched to centre half-forward for the game against North at Norwood next week.

At Thebarton, potential matchwinners in Robran Barrie and Mulvihill were Brian shut out by Glen Pill and Arch Wilkey, but North took complete control after an indifferent first half.

No answer

Rebounding from a dashing defence. North got their flow-on game working in the third term and the Eagles had no answer.

Torrens in sixth place, one game behind Norwood but with a better percentage will probably have to wait until Saturday week for a chance to bridge the Sunday Mail

New Carman move likely

Norwood may have a new move open to them on the controversial Philip Carman clearance case.

The Redlegs may apply again for a clearance for the young first year star.

The SA National Football League's promotions officer, Mr. Don Roach said tonight: "Some doubt exists whether the Victorian Football League's June 30 deadline is valid under Australian National Football Council rules.

"It is generally felt that the relevant ANFC period for clearances is between February and October. "There is a feeling that Norwood should send a prepared application for a clearance from Colling-wood."

Last night at a special meeting of the SANFL at Football House, Norwood unsuccessfully moved that the league should disaffiliate from the ANFC. The move was made by Norwood through Mr.

Ern. Wadham because he was "not very happy" at the way the league was handling the Carman clearance dispute.



MENTIONED recently that Torrens will have no players' contracts next year.

If Glenelg did this it would be goodbye to Wayne Phillis.

It's common knowledge that he has signed with the Tigers - the Victorian Tigers, Richmond, who have also signed Fred Phillis and Woodville's Craig Mc-Kellar on Form Fours (which hold a player for
