BAYS HAD TO SWEAT

West put the pressure on

Three points down at the last change and into the strong breeze for the run home, West really made Glenelg fight for their 12-point win at Richmond.

After their good defensive first quarter into the wind, Glenelg looked like winners. But West's determined last term challenge gave the Tigers plenty of anxious moments.

A lift on the wings and the half-forward flanks was the main factor in West's late challenge.

Hooper finished very strongly on Crabb and Vertudaches too got more of the play against the consistent Rosewarne.

West switched wings early in the first quarter but did not develop any significant drive from these positions until the last term.

Prior to this Burkett was the driving force from this line. He and Marker shared the points at the pivot with the West player the more brilliant.

His effort in the third quarter, when he picked up behind centre and handballed his way through the Bay defence for a goal was the best football of the day.

Glenelg looked clearly the better side in the first quarter.

Despite the breeze they attacked almost as often as West, and their backing up was superior.

Their defence with Wayne Phillis strong in support held West goalless until halfway through the term.

The dominance of Rosewarne and Crabb on the wings, Voigt's roving and Anesbury's scouting in the attack were mainly responsible for Glenelg's creditable 2-2 into the wind.

West's inability to use the breeze to advantage forced them to go heavily defensive in the second term.

They brought Jonas out to centre half forward, put Farmer into ruck, and ran Verrier as an extra defender.

Glenelg were unable to direct their attacks down the western flank and kicked eight behinds straight to squander their chances of setting up a match-winning lead.

Shueard, Pope, and Bray were the mainstays of West's defence with Wayne Phillis consistently making openings for the Bays.

Glenelg's switch of Sandland into ruck after half-time proved to be a good move.

His marking strengthened Glenelg's defence in the vital third term and he grabbed one in the square late in the last quarter to sew the game up.

His replacement at centre half-forward, Darrell Moss, added fluency to the Bay attack but his uncertain ball handling reduced his effectiveness.

West switched Jonas from centre half-forward to full forward but it was only in the time on period that they made any impression on Glenelg's lead.

However, Hooper on the wing was beginning to get the upper hand and he improved at the start of the last quarter.

Brilliant attacking football by Pope added to the resurgence of the wings gave the West half forwards Haupt and Leonard chances to take the lead into the third.

But West missed easy shots and Crabb hit back for an important goal when Bray kicked off to the attacking flank.

West came again but again were unable to convert their opportunities.

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BRIAN COLBEY, GLENELG

Fickle finger beaten

Star footballers at times have to learn to live with an injury.

Glenelg's Brian Colbey is one—with a finger that may eventually have to be amputated.

He coped with it all right against Sturt last Saturday and many considered Colbey best afield.

Playing for South Australia in the national championships at Adelaide Oval last year brought mixed fortunes for Colbey.

He was awarded an all-Australian blazer for consistently brilliant performances at half-back over the three games—against Western Australia, Tasmania, and Victoria.

But some of the gloss of that achievement rubbed off when he came out of the carnival with a badly broken finger, which had to be operated on a week later.

It was broken badly enough to keep Colbey inactive for six matches.

Decision

"Although the finger is not the best I am not conscious of it," he says.

He still cannot straighten the finger and this hampers him when going for marks. "I do not want to have the finger removed," he says.

"A decision will be made at the end of the season."

After the national carnival ended on June 14 he did not re-appear until Glenelg's match against Centrals at Adelaide Oval on August 2.

Colbey, 24, 6.0, and 12 10, is well equipped to stop the foe and rebound for his side. He

has great pace and stopping power.

Last Saturday's fine game—when he beat State squad half-forward John Tilbrook convincingly—was not his best.

He nominates the one in which Glenelg beat Port at Alberton, by seven points last year.

"I got a lot of kicks—and marks," he said.

Colbey was recruited from Brighton in the SA Amateur League, where he began in the Colts.

He played his school football with Dover Gardens Primary, then Brighton High.

The best half-forward he has stood?

"Darrel Baldock (Tasmania and Victoria) . . . and I'm glad I did not play against him when he was younger and at his best."

He gives John Tilbrook his "vote" as the best half-forward flanker he has opposed in SA league football.

"Tilbrook is slippery," he says.

Colbey is attached to the motor traffic branch of the Police Department.

When he gets an awkward shift and misses training he makes up for it with three-mile runs along the beach not far from his home at Brighton.

Brian Colbey's hints to aspiring juniors on half-back play:

Concentration is the greatest asset.

Then come alertness, sticking close to the immediate opponent, keeping in front of him, allowing him minimum kicks and, finally—

ATTACK the ball.
