Aided by West's defeat of North, Norwood bridged the gap between fourth and fifth positions in today's league football when they vanquished Woodville in a thrilling clash at Woodville Oval.

It was Norwood's first success at the ground since 1967. With four wins so far this season, they have already bettered their 1968 and 1969 results.

Drawn against Glenelg at Norwood next week, the Redlegs have a chance to move into the top four as North, in fourth place by percentage only, meet Sturt at Prospect.

In beating North, West gave the lie to last week's form against Norwood and showed they are by no means out of the fight for a place in this year's final four.

Both Norwood and West came from behind to win.

Woodville, eight points up at the time, were unlucky to lose captain Noel Teasdale with the game in the balance in the last quarter.

Glenelg, after an even first half against a much improved Centrals side, gradually drew away to win in a very high scoring game at the Glenelg Oval today.

It was a good game to watch, both sides turning in entertaining passages of flow-on football in such a high-scoring game one would think that both defence was suspect, but this was not the true picture today.

The Bays delivered the ball well to Fred Phillis, who with plenty of room to lead, combined well to finish off many Glenelg attacks.

He had a bad lapse in the first term when he missed a few set shots, but after a message from coach Neil Kerley, he improved.

Open space

Central backs did not play in as tight as Glenelg. Fred Phillis did have plenty of open space to lead into.

This was not the case with the Bays for their backing up of players was far better, but as the score indicates they did not have everything their own way.

Centrals owed plenty to Casserly who seemed to pop up everywhere to create opportunities in attack.

With Johns, he sent Centrals into attack on numerous occasions, but the speed of the forwards, Saywell and Harris, was the nagging problem that confronted the Bays.

Saywell especially at centre half-forward, who used great ground play, recovering quickly if he missed the mark he often left Caldwell flat footed to be the main spearhead for Centrals.

Glenelg's improvement after the half-time break was due to Sandland's solid third term. Newberry, when going to centre wing, became a force.

The Glenelg rucks at centre bounces became a force, one nullifying Farnham, the other thumping or tapping down to their rovers.

Centrals did look lacking when Farnham was being controlled, being let down in skill by Jones, who looked better in field play rather than at centre bounces.

The Bays' last 15 minutes of the third term was their best. They looked from this point that they would go on and win easily.

They put six goals on the board during this period and when they opened the last term and had a goal on the board through Newberry in seconds, the game appeared over.

To Centrals' credit, they fought on matching goal for goal. Even with players tiring, the game was still of a high standard.

Glenelg's best player again was the consistent Wayne Phillis, who is enjoying a great year. He did not carry the ruck work on his own today, for Harry Kernahan produced some of his old skill.

Six goals

Voigt was a very busy rover, and he with Paterson bagged six goals between them.

Rosewarne was best across centre for his team while Colby more than broke even at half-back. Having the ruckman changing n him, had him slightly confused early.

Thrives in the crushes

Some players thrive on the kind of responsibility that benefits both team and individual.

Glenelg rover Rex Voigt can be placed in that category.

He considers his 1970 form his best since joining the Tigers in 1967.

With 62 games up he is now a senior player.

Glenelg at the end of last season, lost a "contingent" of players, including Neil Kerley (now non-playing coach), Doug Long and Ray Button.

"This meant more had to come from the senior players left," says Voigt, who was generally considered best against Torrens last week and near that mark in the previous match against South.

He finished last season in good touch, and in two of Glenelg's three major round games last September Voigt ranked in the best player lists.

Debut

Voigt, at 22, 5.9 and 12.0 is the tallest and heaviest among current league regular rovers.

They are statistics formidable enough to enable him to play in positions like half-forward or half-back.

Half of his league career was at centre wing.

His first league appearance was sitting on the bench and playing the last 10 minutes against Sturt at the Bay.

This followed the first 10 games of 1967 in the Seconds, after having been recruited from Loxton.

There, he had played primary, high school and country football.

When Glenelg had

trouble finding a roving pair of talent Voigt was "requisitioned."

Now, with Keith Pattinson — an Australian carnival rover of last year — and Voigt, Glenelg can claim as good a pair as they come.

Last summer, Voigt achieved a physical fitness not equalled in his previous seasons.

He played a stronger class of cricket with Glenelg C Grade in SACA competition and joined the Glenelg Footballers' basketball team at St. Clair, winning the goalthrowing trophy for his club.

Voigt was in Glenelg's football summer training squad from late January.

Like so many successful sportsmen, Voigt admits to an "edginess" before a game.

"But once I run around the ground before first bounce, I settle down," he says.

Since becoming a Tiger he has been in two major rounds.

Glenelg reached the first semi-final in 1967 and the grand final in 1969.

"It's third time lucky this year."

When relaxing it's time for a collection of LP records that he can sing too.

"But I am only a 'bathroom tenor,'" he hastily adds.

At work with Austmark Pty. Ltd., manufacturers' agents, it's not difficult to talk football.

His boss, Mr. Eric Buifitt, is a Bay supporter from way back.
