Glenelg have firmly entrenched themselves in third place on the league football table.

Their convincing 30-point victory over Norwood today has them two games clear of North Adelaide, Norwood, and West.

North, in a strong reaction to two successive defeats, pushed league leader Sturt all the way before going down by 12 points in a low scoring, crowd pleasing game at Prospect.

At Alberton Port bolted in the second half against Woodville to win by 83 points after being 12 points down.

The Magpies' second half, inspired by the switch of Ebert to centre half-forward, was an impressive build up to the clash of the season so far, against Sturt at Unley next week.

Glenelg meet North at the Bay in another important game next week.

The Red and Whites' recovered a lot of prestige against Sturt today but the Bays, defeated only by Sturt and Port so far, are again shaping like finalists.



Fred's feast

They had too much power in ruck at Norwood today and this strength was supported by the dashing roving that was a feature of their 11-game winning streak last season.

Fred Phillis, with eight goals today, has now kicked 48 in eight games, maintaining the average he set last season in kicking a league record of 137 goals.

Norwood captain coach Bob Oatey put up spirited opposition to Glenelg's power before going down with a leg injury in the last term.

North Adelaide today were a vastly different side to the one which had disappointed its supporters in the past two games.

Tackling hard and backing up strongly, North led narrowly at every change but failed to sustain their effort in the run home.

Barrie Robran was outstanding at centre half-forward against an out of form Philip Nelson.

Unless Nelson can regain touch quickly, Sturt could be in trouble next week with either Woite or Ebert at centre half-forward for Port.

Strengthened

On today's result, Port will be embarrassed with riches in attack if all players are available.

In Freeman's absence from full forward today, Dittmar kicked seven goals.

At Thebarton today, West Torrens' confidence got a boost when they overcame their heavy losses through injury to win well from Central Districts.

The Eagles could move closer to the leaders next week when they should be strengthened by returning players for their clash against South at Thebarton.

The Panthers today trailed all day but put in a strong last quarter against West at Adelaide.

West, in sixth position, one game clear of Woodville, go to Woodville next week.

BAYS PUNISH THE REDLEGS

Fred Phillis key

Superior rucks and rovers, plus Fred Phillis, were the main reasons for Glenelg's convincing win over Norwood at the Norwood Oval.

Glenelg, who led throughout, were continually under pressure, but held at least a two-goal advantage throughout a vigorous game.

Rosewarne, playing his hundredth game, won the toss and kicked to the northern end, favored by a slight breeze.

The huge crowd was not disappointed, as the game started at a furious rate, with both sides throwing themselves at the ball with tooth-jolting vigor.

Norwood and State ruckman R. Kingston withdrew from the original line-up with a virus complaint, and was replaced by Nettlefold.

Setback

This threw an additional burden on the already depleted Norwood rucks.

Despite this setback, it was all Norwood for the first five minutes of play.

Then Fred Phillis accepted a pass from Voigt and kicked the Bays' first goal.

A clever piece of play by Carman at centre half-forward let in Pettingill who streamed forward for Norwood's first goal.

Kernahan replied with a long goal for the Bays.

The main difference between the two sides during the time-on period in the first quarter was Voigt's and Pattinson's roving.

Kicking three goals between them they put the Tigers five goals clear at the first change.

Putting on further pressure Glenelg's W. Phillis, Kernahan, Goldfinch were winning the rucks, and were exerting a strong influence around the ground with

Instead of putting a damper on Norwood's spirits, this seemed to spur them on and they came back strongly through Coligan and Carman for two quick goals.

Norwood, still in attack, could kick only three points through Woodcock, Pettingill, and R. Oatey.

Furious

However, Norwood went into the long change only 15 points down, having made good use of their turn with the wind.

The third term opened fast and furiously as Carman brought the crowd of 15,000 to its feet with a screaming mark over Moss, from which he kicked truly.

The Tigers replied with goals from Fred Phillis and Fitzgerald to keep their lead.

Then Norwood attacked again through Woodcock and Oatey.

In general they outplayed Glenelg in this term, but could not kick goals.

Then Phillis goaled in the opening minutes of the last term and it was nearly all over.

Carman goaled again for Norwood, but Phillis replied with his eighth and Glenelg's twentieth goal.

Even the most loyal Norwood supporters started to leave the ground.
