MIXED FORTUNES FOR SA

South Australian football clubs were successful in three of the seven interstate trial matches in Adelaide and Melbourne today. SA victors were Sturt, Glenelg, and Central Districts.

• AT GLENELG: Glenelg were in outstanding form against Fitzroy and had a resounding 49-point victory in a game that averaged about three scraps a quarter.

The dominance exerted by Glenelg's centre and half-forward line were the key factors in Glenelg's opening with 12-7 in the first

Bays must tire on their own 'fuel'

Glenelg's ability to maintain the high standard it reached in 1969 will depend to a large extent on how successful they are in making good the loss of Neil Kerley's inspiration on the field.

Kerley, like Jock Oatey and Fos Williams, has been a great leader, and it is inevitable that, temporarily at least, the Boys will feel the lack of his commanding presence.

The most striking feature of Glenelg's rise from fifth place in 1968 to nunners-up last season was a phenomenal improvement in attack.

While the defence was almost equally efficient in each of the two miner rounds, Glenelg's forwards kicked more than 1,000 points more than the previous year, to record the highest total yet for a 20-game minor round.

"Fred" Phillis course was the player main!y responsible for putting the score on the board. But his feat, remarkable as it was, was on!, the culmination of power developed further afield.

In particular, Colbey at half-back, Eustice an Rosewarne on the certre line, Marker at haif-forward, Kernahan and the rovers, made the opportunities of which Phillis took full advantage,

In fact, during their 11-game winning sequence, Glenely consistently had nearly every player in control of his position and they looked almost invincible.

To what extent Kerley'; presence on the field helped to sustain this exceptional team effort is hard to gauge, but it must have been a significant influence, despite the fact that injuries frequently af-fected his own game. While Kerley's ab-

sence is the most important loss suffered by the Bays, Kevin Rowe and Doug Long will also be missed.
