Glenelg's courageous seven-point win over Sturt and Norwood's shock three-point loss to West in today's thirteenth round hurtled the Tigers back into final four calculations.

The league competition -or more importantly the fight for fourth position—has sprung to life again after it almost had been laid to rest for the remainder of the minor round.
