## Not disgraced

Norwood were far from disgraced in losing to Glenelg by three points at the Bay Oval.

In a heart-stopping last

quarter, during which the lead changed constantly, Glenelg snatched victory

just before the final siren Norwood looked headed for a heavy loss when they trailed by 40 points at half-time. But they piled on 9-3 to 2-1 in the third quarter to lead by four points at three-quarter

time. Sturt struggled to shake off West in the first half at Unley, but slipped smoothly into top gear in the second half, kicking 9-13 to West's 3-4.

Torrens, after their five-goal win over Glenelg last week, were expected to defeat South at Thebarton. but not by such a con-vincing margin as 75 points.

Centrals' crushing 67point win over Woodville at Elizabeth was the fifth successive match in which the Bulldogs have kicked 100 or more points.

# SIGHS ON

Withstanding a tremendous third term revival by Norwood, the Bays snatched victory in a cliff hanger at Glenelg.

In a titanic final term the lead changed hands on seven occasions with Glenelg holding the trump card - a goal from D. Phillis five minutes into the time-on period.

This goal, his and Glenelg's fifth for the quarter, gave Glenelg a three-point victory.

It capped off one of the best games this season.

The first half of the game belonged completely to Glenelg, who outplayed Norwood with a brilliant display of positive, con-fident football.

An ascendancy in ruck strength in the packs and supremacy in the aerial battles put them on the victory road.

In addition, they backed up extremely well all around the ground to move the ball about assuredly, making Norwood struggle to keep in the game.

Although kicking into a stiff breeze in the first term the Bays adopted a completely positive atti-tude and deserved their nine-point lead.

Whenever Norwood gained possession of the ball they were tackled fiercely. The Redlegs as a result fumbled badly and lost confidence. Consequently their teamwork suffered.

Norwood struggled to hold Glenelg in the second term and when Osborn snapped an extraordinary goal over his left shoulder seven minutes into the quarter the flood gates opened.

The Bays exploded to race 42 points clear at the 15-minute mark.

However, Norwood began a gradual resurgence to keep with the Bays. But they were still looking at a 40-point deficit at half-

In the third term the turnabout with Norwood dictating the game from the first bounce.

The big life

The big lift came in ruck where Schlein set the Redlegs in motion allowing their game to move into gear.

The half-back line tightened considerably and Butchart generated re-bound to give the half-forwards unlimited opportunities.

Woodcock, a clear win-ner in the first half, continued in the same vein and Seekamp fired on the other flank.

By the end of the term the Redlegs had swept-Glenelg aside in turning a 40 point deficit into a fourpoint lead and setting the stage for a thrilling finish.


But no one could have envisaged what was ahead. Both sides displayed champagne football as they matched each other goal for goal.

The big contribution to Glenelg's deserved victory was the outstanding performance of full forward Fred Phillis, who marked powerfully and kicked magnificently.
