The Tigers, grand finalists last season, suffered their third successive loss for the season when they succumbed to Centrals by 23 points at Glenelg Oval.

Although they had lost their first two matches. still were Glenelg strongly tipped to beat

Centrals.

Glenelg coach Neil Kerley was an angry man after his team surprisingly lost to South last week.

Bay hopes dive: Look to Redlegs

Glenelg are not out of it yet, but their chances of making the final four nosedived alarmingly at the Bay Oval today.

And Norwood's 28-point win over North at Prospect confirmed the Redlegs as distinct final four material.

They were the two most significant happenings in today's third round of league football.

Glenelg's 23-point loss to Centrals — their third in as many weeks-has left the Tigers with the formidable task of win-ning at least 12 or 13 of their remaining 18 games.

Glenelg really can only afford to lose about five more games if they are to reach the finals. And Glenelg still have to play Port twice and

Sturt three times. The Bays next game is against Sturt at Adelaide

Oval on Monday week (the Anzac Day holiday). Glenelg's following three opponents will be: Torrens (Glenelg), Nor-wood (Norwood), North

(Adelaide).

Glenelg coach Kerley could not be contacted tonight, but he said on Thursday: "Losyour first three games just about puts you out of business for the season."

Two hurt

The Tigers had two injured players after today's game, but neither is serious.

Half-back Bob Whittaker has a bruised thigh and half-forward Ray Button has a bruised Norwood's convincing

win over a disappointing North has placed the Redlegs at the top of the premiership table ahead of Port on percentage.

Norwood and Port are the only unbeaten teams. Glenelg, Torrens, and Woodville have still to win a match.

Norwood's victory to-day was their first at Prospect since 1965.

Redleg full forward Mike Coligan kicked six goals today and holds a lead four-goal South's Phil Howlett, who kicked nine goals against Woodville at Adelaide Oval today.

Norwood half-forward Roger Woodcock suffered a gashed left cheek at Prospect.

South centre half-forward Peter Jones damaged a knee ligament against Woodville and could miss some games.

Woodville centre halfforward Malcolm Blight went off with a "corked thigh" at the start of the third quarter at Adelaide, and ruckman Fred Hansch was replaced at three-quarter time with a shoulder injury.

West back pocket Trevor Hughes sprained his left ankle against Port and might miss next week's game against Norwood at Adelaide Oval.

AT GLENELG

Centrals jumped the Bays from the first bounce at Glenelg Oval.

The Bulldogs won decisively because they outplayed Glenelg with pace and teamwork.

Glenelg appeared flatfooted and lethargic.

They never recovered from Centrals' burst of 2-2 in the first two minutes, kicking into the stiff breeze.

Farnham, winning the supported Haughan and Casserly, gave the Centrals little men a feast and they tore pieces in the sluggish Glenelg defence.

Glenelg's ruck work was tightened by Cornes. But the Bays were unable to capitalise on the opportunities because of the efficient tackling of

the Centrals side.

Pressure

Early in the game Mulholland and Norsworthy in particular created the loose man effectively. Mulholland kept it up

for the entire game. Voigt, particularly in the first half, offset this advantage with his tireless ball-getting but he had no support.


Centrals, however, always had more players at the drop of the ball, allowing them to break clear and dispatch the ball with far more deliberation.

Thanks only to Voigt, Marker and Cornes as Glenelg trailed at halftime by only 16 points.

Marker played a lone hand across centre where he eclipsed Johns in the first half and continued to play well thereafter. But the Bays received no

Despite the number of kicks won by Marker, Johns turned in a solid last half when his penetration—the result of good support from his team-mates—did for Centrals superiority.

Glenelg had a chance to redeem their first half effort when Sandland had two opportunities to goal early in the third term and could manage only behinds on each occasion.

Conversion of these chances was the necessary needle Glenelg required to put them in an offensive mood but, despite the two quick goals from W. Phillis that followed, they missed the opportunity.

Burst

Although Centrals remained under the hammer when Cornes goaled eight minutes into the Bulldogs' mained calm.

quarter for the Bays to lead by five points, the defence re-Nicks, in particular, who had hardly been sighted until this term,

burst on to the scene to

hold up repeated attacks and generate valuable rebound for the Bulldogs.

But the biggest hurdle Glenelg were unable to negotiate was the blan-keting of their star full forward Fred Phillis by the under-rated Centrals full back Kroehn.

Strong

He was capably supported by the dashing Swinstead, who gobbled up all the crumbs with an insatiable appetite, and the strong marking of O'Connor.

Centrals would be well pleased with the first-up performance of Haughan cleared from WA to take part in the game — who marked and kicked strongly and in particular created unlimited opportunities with the use of good football brains.

His individual effort at the eight minute mark of the final term — when he plucked the ball over the back of the rucks at a throw-in and hooked a magnificent goal, proved to be a match-winner. At this stage, Glenelg

still had a chance to regain poise but Haughan's effort completely sealed the coffin.
