This season's league football final four could well be resolved after only six rounds.

The top four teams—Norwood, Sturt, North, and Port -have emerged as the best sides in the competition.

Odds on any of the other six teams playing in the finals lengthened after today's upsets.

Norwood are the only unbeaten side and their form would have to deteriorate enormously for the Redlegs to miss the final four.

Sturt, North, and Port - with only one loss each -look a cut abovet he sides below them.

In this season's 21-game minor round, it is likely that at least 13 wins will be necessary to play at Adelaide Oval in September.

Sturt. North and Port would need to win eight of their next 15 matches to play in the finals. That is a contract which each of the three teams

should be capable of fulfilling. They are four points (two wins) ahead of fifthranked South, six points ahead of West (sixth) and

eight points clear of Glenelg. Centrals, Torrens and While the six sides out of the top four may cause

some upsets, they will have a tough time trying to make up their big leeway. Before today's games, Port, Sturt, and Norwood (in that order) were rated the best chances for

the premiership. But North's shock 83-point win over Port has hurled the Roosters into premiership discussions. For years North have promised so much, then

have been disappointing when the pressure has been applied. However, North won so conclusively today it seems they are on the verge of shaking off the

"inconsistent and iffy" tags. North's winning margin of 83 points is believed to be the biggest win the Roosters have had over

Port had scored more than any other side in the first five games this season, yet managed only 8-7 against North's 21-12.

Narrow escape

Sturt, troubled by transfers and injuries, had a narrow escape against West at Richmond. West led by nine points at the time-on period
