They pile up 226 points

North struck a rich double against South today, kicking a record score for SA league football, and winning by a record margin.

The Roosters sent the Adelaide Oval scoreboard spinning with 34-22 (226 points) to South's paltry 6-12 (48).

The previous record was West's 33-23—also at Adelaide Oval — on the last day of the minor round, 1959.

South then was also the sufferer, kicking 6-10—an almost identical score to that of today.

North's record margin today was 178 points—almost the equivalent of 30 goals.

Five players kicked a minimum of four goals.

Neil Sachse, the third full forward tried by North this season, led the way with 6-4.

Captain-coach Mike Patterson was a shining example with 5-2, Barrie Bamford kicked 5-1, while Barry Hearl got 4-3 and Terry von Bertouch 4-1.

Six other players booted goals.

FOURTH ON PERCENTAGES

It all enabled North to take fourth place (by 1.75 per cent.) over Sturt (fifth).

A new record was "on" when North kicked 12-6 to 1-2 in a devastating opening quarter.

In following terms the Roosters notched 5-5, 7-10, and finished with a magnificent last quarter of 10-1, to set the highest figure by five points.

There was nothing to the last quarter except that every score was cheered with ecstatic North supporters calling for "more."

Today also probably presented a record aggregate tally of 89-71 over a four-match day.

Norwood were well to the fore by kicking 25-17 and beating Woodville by 98 points.

They also had Phil Carman returning brilliantly to football after nearly two years—because of de-registration involving South Australia and Victoria and three clubs, Norwood, Collingwood, and Edenhope.

GLENELG SNATCH VICTORY IN LATE RUN

Glenelg snatched victory from unlucky West in the dying stages of a great game at Richmond.

After a slow start, West played brilliant football to take the initiative from the Bays.

Glenelg kicked 3-4 in the first term before West scored. At this point it didn't look like West's day.

But the game changed dramatically.

Tightening their defence, West began to attack from the half-back line.

Fraser got on top at centre and Leonard was a winner at half-forward.

But the big surprise was in the forward pocket where Aldo Russian incredibly and to the amazement of even the staunchest West supporter, kicked four goals in the first quarter.

IN COMMAND

Russian played a very good first half. Apart from his four goals in the first term, he was prominent early in the second when West ran to a 34-point lead.

With Verrier in command at the centre bounces and Nicholson roving strongly, West cut holes in the Bay defence.

Glenelg switched Fred and Wayne Phillis in an attempt to overcome Pope's dominance at centre half-back, but the Bays were unable to develop any consistent drive to their forwards.

West's speed and teamwork were first class as they raced away.

The Bays effort in fighting back for three valuable goals before half-time was a tribute to perseverance more than anything else.

ORIGINAL

Marker in his new position at centre half-back, Cornes and Carey on the ball and Millard on the wing did most to keep Glenelg in the picture.

West brought Hewitt out to centre half-forward in the first quarter when they were unable to get past Marker.

He returned to full forward in the last term.

Although outplayed in the first half, Glenelg retained their original line-up for the start of the third quarter.

They immediately looked a better side.

Cornes was effective in getting the ball away from the bounces and Caldwell began to attack with greater certainty from half-back.

Osborn on the wing improved on his quiet first half.

West still produced some brilliant football but Glenelg's strength was beginning to tell as they cut their half-time deficit in half.

The last quarter was a real thriller.

Glenelg twice drew to within three points in the first 10 minutes but West kicked away like a good side.

Both sides made tactical replacements in a tense struggle for the decisive break.

West, seeking to retain their edge in pace, brought on Burkett for Wadewitz.

SPEED

Glenelg's moves were more effective.

Moss replaced Hockridge and Wayne Phillis going into ruck and Graubner replaced Sandland.

Moss's speed was just what was needed in the Bay forward area.

He goaled to bring the scores into touch and Graubner kicked the goal that put Glenelg in front three minutes into time on.

In addition, Wayne Phillis's strength was valuable in the ruck in the closing stages.

West used a fixed defence throughout.
