UMPIRE MEAD STRUCK

Field umpire Peter Mead was struck by a spectator as he entered the players' race immediately after the Centrals-Torrens match at Thebarton Oval yesterday.

The spectator, a man in his early twenties, was grabbed by police who were standing at the mouth of the race.

Police took his name and questioned him. Late last night, it was still not known if the man had been, or would be, charged with an offence.

It is understood Mead may consult with members of the Umpires' Board.

Mead, who was not hurt in the incident, was the target of a "hot" reception as he sprinted from the ground.

Neither Centrals nor Torrens supporters, particularly the latter, were satisfied with Mead's display.

Centrals fought back to snatch victory by seven points after Torrens looked certain winners late in the last quarter.

CASSERLY HURT

Centrals captain-coach Tony Casserly will have an X-ray for a possible fractured cheekbone.

Casserly did not resume after three-quarter time.

Torrens utility player Mike Shallow also will have an X-ray—for a suspected broken bone in his left hand.

Centrals general manager, Mr. Brian Ashmeade, said after the game that rover Barry Norsworthy would train at Elizabeth Oval this morning.

Norsworthy, who has made himself unavailable for the past three matches, was in the Bulldogs' room immediately after yesterday's game.

Centrals will displace Norwood from fifth position on the league ladder if they beat the Redlegs at Norwood Oval next Saturday.

Norwood have only a .02 percentage lead over the Bulldogs.

South centreman Ian Jackman was taken to hospital with concussion after the match at Woodville Oval.

And South half-back flanker Phil Reimann went off in the last quarter with a pulled right hamstring muscle.

Glenelg ruckman Bob Tardif injured an ankle against Sturt at Adelaide Oval.

North ruckman John Spry hurt an ankle at Prospect Oval and was replaced at three-quarter time.

Port ruckman Leon Milde went off in the third quarter at Alberton because of an injured calf muscle, and West follower Neville Miller was replaced in the third term with an ankle injury.

Switches do trick

The start of the Glenelg revival was sparked by the move of Fred Phillis to centre half-back in the third term to counter the classy Casey.

In the last term Marker went to centre and gave the Bays their first winner across this line for the game.

And Glenelg's fresh men in Caldwell and later Marriott were decisive in the last quarter fightback.

CAVED IN

Sturt's brilliant players early failed to sustain their game as they caved in to the relentless pressure applied by the Bays.

The Bays were not allowed to penetrate the stern Sturt defence in the opening passages of play, with Klomp, Adcock, and Winter handballing easily out of danger.

The second term was Sturt's best, when across centre Howard, Graham and Burgan drove the ball into attack to provide the opportunities for the forwards to build up what should have been a match-winning break.

This did not eventuate because of Sturt's poor goalscoring, particularly from Greenslade, who finished the game with the shocking tally of 3-8.

Glenelg's fierce approach and their stronger will to win paid dividends after half-time. In the second half they outscored Sturt 8-7 to 2-7.

The third term developed into a battle of defences and goals were hard to come by.

Sturt again were off-

target, while Glenelg got their lift when Fred Phillis went to centre half-back and more opportunities were created for their forwards.

Glenelg's run of goal-getting began in the dying moments of the third term, but even at this point Sturt still looked likely winners with the Bays needing a big improvement.

The boost came in the last term from Marker when he was switched to centre to give Glenelg, for the first time, a winner across this important line. Coupled with this, coach Neil Kerley brought on a fresh man in big Caldwell, who gave extra life across half-forward.

Sturt were valiant in their attempt to stem the Tiger onslaught, but the individual die-hard effort of Graham Cornes set the example for the inspired Bay team.

The whole of the Glenelg side lifted and Sturt were rarely able to penetrate past centre.

Marker won a lot of kicks all over the ground but was most damaging from the pivot, where he set Glenelg alight.

For three terms Sturt had a very even side. It was hard to separate 10 players in this period, but none was more exciting than Graham at centre wing and Mick Nunan, who had more handballs in the first half than kicks.

Nunan was the player who, had he kept up his effort in the last term, could have turned the flow of the ball more Sturt's way.
