**TIGERS NEAR RECORD SCORE**

Glenelg kicked the fourth highest score in league football history in demolishing North by 160 points at the Bay Oval.

Coach Neil Kerley described his team's amazing win as the "best effort I've seen from a Glenelg side."

The Tigers, who won virtually everywhere, had the phenomenally high total of 134 handball's.

Secretary-manager Harry Kernahan agreed with Kerley.

Few, if any, of the 14,499 spectators at Glenelg Oval yesterday would disagree.

The remarkably ruthless manner in which the Tigers tore North apart almost defies description.

It was no secret that Glenelg desperately wanted to avenge their 27-point loss to North at Prospect in the seventh series.

But not even Kerley, at his most optimistic best, could have hoped for such a crushing result.

Glenelg's 33-20 (218) was only eight points short of equalling the State record—North's 34-22 (226) against South at Adelaide Oval last season.

Only other higher scores than Glenelg's mammoth tally were West's 33-23 (221) against South at Adelaide Oval in 1959, and Torrens' 34-15 (219) against South at Adelaide Oval in 1950.

It was the ninth time Glenelg had booted 20 or more goals this season but the first time they had passed 30.

For North, it was their second humiliation in only three weeks. Port thrashed them by 89 points at Alberton in the thirteenth series.

The Roosters can reflect on what might have been had they fielded a more complete team.

Ten players, most of whom would make North's best 20, were unavailable yesterday.

**Suspension**

Neil Sachse was serving the last week of his six-match suspension, and the other nine were injured.

They were Bob Hammond, Dennis Sachse, Charlie Payne, Alan Howard, John Spry, Adrian Rebbeck, John Plummer, Ken Francou, and Bob Ford.

Hammond, Dennis Sachse, Howard, Spry, and Ford are expected to be fit enough to resume against Sturt at Prospect on Saturday.

That the new centre diamond rule has boosted scoring opportunities was emphasised again yesterday when 192 goals were kicked in the five matches—an average of just over 38 goals a game.

It was the highest scoring round in history (see Back Page).

North's huge loss and Sturt's continued good form gave further support to the contention that it could well be a Glenelg-Sturt grand final this season—as it was in 1969 and 1970.

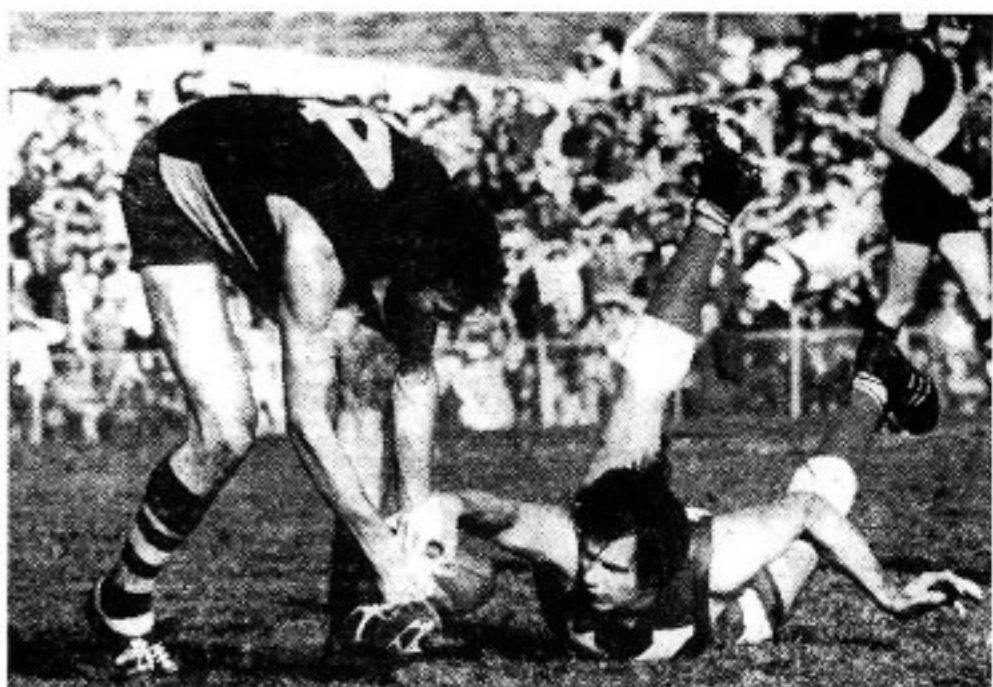

**NORTH SUNK BY BAY DELUGE**

Glenelg, in a brilliant and devastating display of flow-on football created by classy hand-passing, savaged North at the Bay yesterday winning with 153 points to spare.

Despite North being crippled with injuries, the Bays could not be robbed of higher praise in their onslaught on last year's champions of Australia.

Players such as Barry Robran, brother Rodney, and Terry von Bertouch were left flat-footed and almost bewildered in the Bay mud.

Only one team — Sturt — can boast better hand-balling when they had 146 against Centrals on May 26.

North tried their confusion tactics in the diamond at the opening, but it backfired because the Tigers were more interested in getting to the ball first and firing it forward.

Glenelg owed a lot to Marker, Cornes, and Hamilton.

This trio was never smothered from the game and continually created opportunities for players upfield. The Roosters had no real replacement for Hammond, who was injured against Port last week, and Carey and Sandland had a feast in front of goals.

It was not surprising after a second term burst of 11-4 by the Tigers, that they received a continued standing ovation as they left the field for the big break.

This second quarter was some of the best football I have ever witnessed—on or off the ground.

The third quarter was highlighted by the high flying Peter Carey.

Glenelg's excellent backing up allowed them to enter the forward lines in torrents of Tiger attacks. North's only player to show any fight was their goalsneak Barry Hearl, who did well from limited attacks to finish the afternoon with 4-4.

It was hard to separate the Bays' best three, Cornes, Marker, and Hamilton.

Each player did his job to perfection. Marker ran his own ground, Cornes outleapt and outmarked the Rooster rucking ranks, and Hamilton started most of the match-winning handball tactics.

The summary cannot pass without mention of MacFarlane at centre wing, who combined well with his team mates to carry the ball forward, and big Tregenza who fought tirelessly all day to hold North's rucks to his knees.
