Centrals have stolen fifth position from Norwood—and the Bulldogs now seem likely to play Port in the elimination final at Norwood Oval next Saturday week.

In yesterday's twentieth series, the Redlegs were tipped out of the top five for the first time since the seventh round because of their 14-point loss to North at Adelaide Oval and Centrals' crushing 54point win over Port at Alberton.

To regain fifth position and meet Port in the elimination final, Norwood must defeat the Magples at Norwood next Saturday and trust that North beat Centrals at Elizabeth.

Torrens, who had a slim chance of grabbing fifth place ahead of Centrals and Norwood, cannot make it now.

The Eagles' percentage deficit is too much to make up, even if they beat Glenelg at Thebarton next Saturday (which is extremely unlikely) and Centrals and Norwood lose.

FIRST SUCCESS
