BILLY'S BLAZING!

West Torrens' coach Billy Barrot refused to talk to his players at three-quarter time in the match against Glenelg at Adelaide Oval yesterday.

Barrot, disgusted with Torrens' 59-point deficit, sent Seconds' coach Wayne Jackson out to deliver the three-quarter time address.

"Bustling" Billy remained on the coach's bench with chairman of selectors Doug Hughes and runner Brian Mulvihill.

Barrot's only comment last night was: "I am dumb-founded by our performances over the past two weeks because our performances in the previous fortnight had been up to standard."

He spoke to only two players in Torrens' dressing room immediately after the game.

They were half-back flanker Steve Pavlich and half-forward Ian Wallace, both of whom were injured. Pavlich had several stitches inserted in a cut cheek and eye, and Wallace had several stitches in a badly gashed nose and forehead.

However, Barrot went to Thebarton Oval last night for post-match drinks with players, officials and supporters.

Barrot, who is extremely popular with everyone at Thebarton, including Torrens players, is one of the most brilliant, colorful, and controversial players in Victorian Football League in the past decade.

His VFL career was studded with newspaper reports of his on, and off-the-field actions.

Barrot, in his first season as Torrens' coach, is unable to play at present because of a broken thumb.

Refuses to talk to team

In the Eagles' pre-season trial game against West Australian club East Perth, Barrot said only a few words to his players at three-quarter time before storming back to the coach's bench.

His action yesterday in refusing to talk to his players is similar to that of a Victorian league coach, believed to be Ron Barassi, who also was so irate that he scorned Carlton players in one match.

Torrens lost to Glenelg by a crushing 117 points. 26-12 (168) to 7-9 (51).

The Eagles were outscored 18-7 to 3-2 in the second half.

They scored only one goal in the third quarter—in the time-on period — and their two goals in the last term also were kicked in the time-on period.

Glenelg's enormous winning margin again raises the inevitable question: Just how good are the Tigers?

Glenelg and North are still unbeaten after three matches each.

Centrals will be the only other unbeaten side if they defeat Norwood at Adelaide Oval tomorrow.

Port centre half-forward Randall Gerlach was the outstanding player in yesterday's four games.

He grabbed the phenomenally high total of 21 marks against South at Alberton Oval.

Glenelg wingman Colin Anderson was reported in the second quarter of the game against Torrens at Adelaide Oval.

He was reported by field umpire Richard Charlesworth for allegedly kicking Torrens wingman Aldo Floriani.

Anderson also suffered a bruised right wrist, which will be X-rayed on Tuesday.

A former Melbourne wingman, Anderson returned home last night for the Easter break.

Glenelg vice-captain Laurie Rosewarne bruised his right shoulder. He will have it X-rayed on Tuesday.

Torrens' full back Brenton Bills was taken to hospital with concussion after falling heavily on his head in the second quarter.

South had four players carrying injuries after the game at Alberton — ruckmen Peter Darley (left hamstring), Jeff Ryan (broken blood vessel in right calf), Max Jochinke (bruised right hip), and captain-coach Dave Darcy (soreness below right knee).

Darley is likely to be out for at least two matches.

West full back Terry Papst pulled a hamstring, and Sturt ruckman Greg Wild twisted an ankle in the game at Unley.

North centre half-back Arch Wilkey received a heavy knock in the lower abdomen at Prospect, and Woodville centreman Eddie Holland went off at three-quarter time after being kicked above a knee.

Glenelg Seconds player Wayne Fitzgerald was reported by goal umpire N. Hill for allegedly attempting to strike West Torrens Peter Cousins in the second quarter at Adelaide Oval.

Bays reshuffle and rout Eagles

After a hard-fought first half in which Torrens matched Glenelg's vigor, the Bays made vital positional changes and won as they liked at Adelaide Oval.

The Eagles surprised by opening with John Graham at centre half-forward, Milan Foletic at centre half-back and Peter Kelly roving.

Probably due to the greasy conditions, Glenelg had Darryl Moss on the reserves bench, with Greg Bennett starting on a half-forward flank.

The difference between the two sides in the first half was the Bays' more sustained teamwork and their ability to do something productive up forward.

SWITCHED

Marker and Voigt were the players who created opportunities in the forward lines and although Torrens were in control at centre half-back and full-back, the Bays had enough alternatives to lead comfortably at half-time.

In the first half, Graham handled the unfamiliar centre half-forward role effectively, while McKenzie was the best ruckman.

Torrens failed to make the most of chances to

bridge the gap in the first half of the second term.

Half-way through this quarter the most significant move of the match was forced on Glenelg by an injury to Colin Anderson.

His replacement, Moss, went into ruck, Hamilton to the wing, and Marker to centre.

Marker gradually took control at the pivot and in the second half was in complete command, as Glenelg kicked 18-7 to demolish and demoralise the Eagles.

Injury to Rosewarne forced the Bays into further changes at half-time. Again, they lost nothing in the reshuffle.

Hamilton went to the back pocket where he continued to play strongly. Bennett to the wing, which he made a strong post, and Moss' speed on the half-forward flank suggested he should have been in the side from the start.

Kerley switched Wayne Phillis to centre half-forward, Fred Phillis to centre half-back, and Peter Carey to full forward.

Wayne Phillis was a dominant figure in Glenelg's devastating last quarter.

Torrens had few consistently good players. McKenzie was effective in ruck, but lacked mobility, which made Tardif

and Cornes a big influence for the Bays.

Peter Kelly's strength was valuable early in the game, but it was surprising that Harry Puhle, who went to the back pocket after replacing Brenton Bills, was not used in a more attacking role.

Puhle's speed would have been more likely to counter the influence of Voigt and Marriott.

Although Glenelg's superior understanding and better use of handball marked them as winners from the start, the Eagles' second half was extremely disappointing.

Too Bard for Eagles

For two quarters at Adelaide Oval yesterday Torrens went in as hard as I have seen the Eagles ever play.

But in the second half, Glenelg ran away to win by 117 points.

So for coach Neil Kerley it was a case of all's well that ends well.

There were a few lively incidents but on the whole it was much ado about nothing.

I've decided it's time to introduce some literary quality into the football pages with the aid of Shakespeare.

Well, I was told tomorrow is the anniversary of Shakespeare's birth and death.

I'm always open to suggestions but after a couple of hours I still hadn't discovered for whom he played. Then my not so advanced education came to the surface and I realised he was that writing fella.

And at least I know the titles of some of the Bard's plays.

IT was moves made by Kerley after half-time and moves forced



on Torrens because of the injury to Brenton Bills which made the difference.

With Wayne Phillis beaten pointless at centre half-back by John Graham and Fred Phillis held goal-less by Brenton Bills Kerley decided it had to be measure for measure.

So Wayne went to centre half-forward, Carey to full forward, and Fred to centre half-

back. And all the moves succeeded.

It was really bad luck for Torrens and for Brenton when he was concussed. He must be a strong contender for the full back position in the State side.

Colbey on a half-back flank was a real Shylock. He could be a member of the North Adelaide management committee the way he gives nothing away.

His marking and disposal make him a certainty for the State side. He and Twiggy Caldwell on the other flank repeatedly turned defence into attack.

Bob Tregenza would not win a prize for the male model of the year but with him the play's the thing.

He's ungainly but when he drives in for the ball, regardless of the opposition, it's football as I like it (there's

something about this Shakespeare lark). He was among the Tigers' best.

Cornes, the Glenelg Blond Bombshell, summed up the result afterwards: "It was a great team effort."

So it was. Barring a lot of injuries the Tigers must be in the final five.

Bad luck for Bill Barrot. At three-quarter time the match was over. He couldn't complain about the Eagles' approach in the first half but that was the end of it.

And as Bustling Billy stayed on the coach's bench at the last change he resembled Hamlet — moody and lost in thought.

Maybe staying there was to indicate to his players on the field that he was disgusted with them. But this

isn't the way to coach a league team.

If my interpretation is wrong, I'm sorry. But trying to get the good oil after the game I had the Torrens door slammed in my face by an officious doorkeeper who barked at me like Rin-Tin-Tin. And a trainer was screaming like a hysterical woman.

If Bill is trying to get the message to his players that a loss is not a thing to be shrugged off I agree—but it wouldn't hurt to let his supporters know how he feels rather than keep them on the other side of locked doors.

To continue with the Avon calling, umpire Charlesworth's performance was a comedy (or tragedy) of errors.

It looked as if he didn't know there is a holding-the-man, holding-the-ball rule, his judgment of marks were ridiculous for a wet day, and his positioning cost Torrens at least two goals.
