**7 STURT MEN HURT IN BRUISER**

Seven Sturt players were injured in a torrid game against West Torrens at Thebarton Oval yesterday.

Feeling between the clubs ran high during and after the match.

Sturt officials would not comment officially on the abnormally high injury list, nor on how they believed the injuries were sustained.

But the atmosphere in the Blues' dressing room was unusually subdued immediately after the game.

The seven players injured were:

- Ruckman GREG WILD broken ribs, replaced in the first quarter, admitted to hospital.
  - Rover MICK NUNAN and centreman BRENDON HOWARD—concussion.
  - Full forward KEN WHELAN—stitches above left eye.
  - Centre half-back PHIL NELSON, back pocket BRENTON ADCOCK, and half-forward flanker MALCOLM GREENSLADE—bleeding noses.
- In addition, two Seconds players were injured in the early game at Thebarton.
- Centre half-forward GEOFF LOVELOCK was concussed, and captain-coach and former league and State half-back TERRY SHORT had stitches inserted above an eye.

**'The last thing'**

Torrens' coach BILLY BARROT vigorously defended his players after the game.

Asked if he felt they had used too much vigor or had thrown their arms and legs around unnecessarily, Barrot said: "Definitely not.

"That's the last thing I'd teach our boys. "I wouldn't have anything to do with any accusations against our players.

"The game is won by getting the ball. "I'm sorry for the Sturt boys. But things happen during a game.

"I know what it's all about. "I had facial stitches six times in eight games playing in the VFA last year.

"Our players are starting to attack the ball more now. "I thought we attacked it harder than the opposition today."

Some years ago, Torrens were labelled "sheilas" and "fairies" by opposing team.

Those derisive accusations could not be levelled at the Eagles this season, nor on the past couple of years.

**Gallagher injured**

Norwood's brilliant young wingman PHILLIP GALLAGHER will not play again for several weeks. He will have his left collarbone pinned at Ashford Hospital this morning.

Gallagher was involved in a heavy collision with West's FRANK LEONARD late in the third quarter at Norwood.

Field umpire Peter Craig was widely criticised by players, officials, and supporters for his handling of the Norwood-West match.

Glenelg, who reached 20 goals for the fourth successive week, remained the only unbeaten team after the completion of the fourth series.

**WESTIES MAY GET HAINES**

Executive secretary of West Adelaide Football Club, Mr. Reg Ellis, last night announced that Jim Haines, 6 ft. 2 in. follower from South Melbourne, had been formally interviewed about an immediate clearance.

Mr. Ellis said Richmond had given his club permission to interview several players in exchange for Glyn Hewitt. This would be discussed at Tuesday night's committee meeting.

Mr. Ellis returned from a meeting with the East Perth committee with a written proposal to West Adelaide that Dick Michalczyk would be cleared to South Australia at the end of the season if he returned to East Perth immediately.

**TIGER STRENGTH DOWNS SOUTH**

After a very lethargic start, Glenelg's big man strength eventually wore down a spirited South for a decisive victory at Adelaide Oval.

After being five goals down at the first break, the Tigers produced three even goalscoring quarters whereas South failed to capitalise on their opportunities.

Acting captain Coombe set the pattern for South's first quarter onslaught, continually sending the Panthers deep into attack. His creative football, especially at the centre bounces, gave South unlimited opportunities and they slammed on seven goals.

With Bennett playing at centre half-forward and having an occasional run on the ball, South had a safe avenue of attack.

Bustling around the packs, Bennett continually fired handpasses to Coombe and other teammates and the Panthers completely outpaced the Tigers.

Coombe maintained his good form, but he lacked consistent support.

**Crumbled**

And when Bennett limped from the field with a sprained ankle in the third term, South crumbled to the Tigers.

It was the Glenelg big men — Carey, Tardif, Tregenza, Cornes, and Sandland — who stole the game from South.

During South's unexpected first quarter onslaught, it was Carey and Tardif who carried the Bays.

Carey's fingertip marking, and Tardif's strong ruck work triggered Glenelg's few attacks.

But they lacked "legs" around the packs, and Glenelg did not use intelligent hand passing.

South were always first to the ball, and when the Bays gained possession the Panthers were always hot on their trail.

Coach Kerley "blasted" them at quarter time, and although they recovered

slightly they were still not impressive.

At the big break the Bays' lead was a solitary point . . . and Kerley gave them another "roasting."

The Tigers came out full of fight.

**Looked good**

Players who had been unsighted in the first half threw themselves into the game.

Cornes in particular bobbed up all around the ground with big marks and speedy handball.

The Bays looked good. For the first time they had some run in their game and introduced constructive handpassing to find their team mates further afield.

Marker took over at centre, Wickens controlled his forward flank, and rovers Voigt and Marriott collected kicks aplenty.

Glenelg piled on the goals from Sandland, who had been shifted to full-forward, Carey, Wickens, and Voigt.

Their big men were supreme in the air, and the ground men started to sprint away from South.

Thirteen goals came the Tigers' way in the last half, and South could manage only four.

Generally it was a disappointing game for the Bays, who have ruled the league ladder in the first three games.

But they showed a little polish when they streaked away from South in the last term to win by nine goals.
