But the atmosphere in the Blues' dressing room was unusually subdued immediately after the game, The seven players injured were:

HOWARD—concussion. • Full forward KEN WHELAN-stitches above left

 Centre half-back PHIL NELSON, back pockét BRENTON ADCOCK, and half-forward flanker MALCOLM GREENSLADE—bleeding noses.

In addition, two Seconds players were injured in the early game at Thebarton.

Centre half-forward GEOFF LOVELOCK was concussed, and captain-coach and former league and State half-back TERRY SHORT had stitches inserted above an eye.

'The last thing'

Torrens' coach BILLY BARROT vigorously defended his players after the game.

Asked if he felt they had used too much vigor or had thrown their arms and legs around unnecessarily, Barrot said: "Definitely not.

"That's the last thing I'd teach our boys. "I wouldn't have anything to do with any accusations against our players.

"The game is won by getting the ball. "I'm sorry for the Sturt boys. But things

happen during a game. "I know what it's all about.

"I had facial stitches six times in eight games playing in the VFA last year.

"Our players are starting to attack the ball more now.
