

He suggested what seems a good idea, that there be junior member-

ship of the league with boys and girls at primary and high schools obtaining a season's badge - either from school or their league clubs - and paying, say, 15 cents (primary) or 35 cents at the oval on production of the badge. A new one would be issued each year. With the rivalry of
