SO NOW, A 3-WAY FIGHT

Take your pick for this year's league football premiership — Glenelg, North, or Sturt.

On current form, it's looming as a three-way fight between those sides.

Shock losses to Port and Norwood in yesterday's ninth round emphasised that widely-held opinion.

Torrens crushed Port by 53 points at Thebarton. and Woodville beat Norwood by 10 points at Woodville.

Yesterday's loss was their third in the last four games-a fact which must be causing grave concern to the Port hierachy.
