

Hamilton left the field at the end of the first quarter and Anderson was carried off by trainers in the last term.

Anderson appeared to be in some pain in the Glenelg room after the game while having the ankle strapped.

Hamilton was walking with some discomfort.

Ruckman Bob Tardif and wingman Peter Millard also had treatment for leg knocks, but should be able to train on Tuesday.

The Tigers' State run-on follower Graham Cornes is still concerned about his damaged ribs, which kept him out of the preliminary final.

Before Glenelg collected injuries and bruises from yesterday's rugged clash, Sturt had a leisurely 80-minute morning training session at Unley Oval.

There's a very worried Glenelg superstar walking the streets today....

. . . . Graham Cornes, hero of the Bays' 1973 premiership team.

Cornes was out with injured ribs and had to watch his teammates play the pants off Port in the preliminary final at Football Park yesterday.

Now Cornes ought to get a game in anyone's footy side but yesterday his stand-in, Neville (Twiggy) Caldwell, was outstanding.

"How on earth am I going to get back in that

side?" Cornes asked after the game.

Well luckily for Cornes but unluckily for the Bays, ruckman Colin Anderson has a bad ankle injury and could miss the grand final.

So Cornes might JUST scrape back into the side. The Bays really turned on a treat for the 37,784 people at the ground yesterday.

It was the best game of football I have seen this year, with amazing individual and team efforts.

At three-quarter time just three behinds separated the sides, but the Tigers rose to the occasion and booted 10-2 to Port's last quarter total of 2-4, and won by 49 points.

'STARTED LIKE A TRAIN

Hobby dropped out of the Port 21 with Hayes and Kinnear the reserves. Glenelg were unchanged.

Carey was at centre half-forward and Anderson in the ruck when the game started but the move of Carey to centre half-forward was a match-winner.

The contest of the day was between Ebert and Marker. Although Marker was not in the centre at the start he took over when Hamilton left the ground injured at quarter time.

But even before Hamilton went off Marker was picking up Ebert.

Ebert started like a train and it looked like Marker was going to have a torrid time. But by the end of the first quarter the Glenelg man had got on top. And he stayed there.

Marker's kicks found players and his handpasses were very creative.

His old confidence and magic were back.

By the end of the first term it was obvious Carey was too tall and solid for Woite.

So coach Cahill moved James, who is slightly taller and stronger than Woite, to mind Carey. It

was a formidable assignment. Darrell Cahill also gave notice within the first

minutes of the game that he was going to be lethal around the goals. Port's first two goals were kicked by Cahill and the next two by the other rover Cun-

ningham. They finished with 11 of the Magpies' 17 between them, highlighting a glaring Glenelg weakness.

Wickens replaced Hamilton and went to the forward flank as Marker took his proper place in the


After quarter time Kingston went to centre halfforward and Gerlach into the ruck. Gerlach had been well beaten by Wayne Phillis and the shift was an obvious attempt to stir him up.

But at the same time it may have been a move

contributing to Port's defeat.

Kingston has always had knee trouble, and the back pocket is ideal for these players - straightforward with little turning. Centre half-forward is another matter, and he was generally contained by Phillis.

RAY BARBER'S SNAPSHOTS

How could Glenelg fail to sail into the grand final after recent nightmares in goalkicking inaccuracy turned into pleasant dreams?

On August 17 the Tigers lost to the Magpies by 11 points at the Bay—after kicking 15-29 (8-16 in the last quarter).

In the Tigers' other two minor round losses to the Magpies they kicked more behinds than goals.

When Peter Carey became a dynamo in the last quarter, kicking three goals (seven for the match) the Tigers kicked three goals in 2½ minutes and then another two to make the spectacular interlude five goals in five minutes.

With both sides sharing 42-23 for the game. Port's 17-11 earned an honorable mention.

It was a pity the disappointing crowd of 37,784 was not larger to appreciate what was one of the best preliminary finals for years.

SOUTHERN Cross skipper Jim Hardy led the overseas contingents telegrams of best wishes to both sides.

Hardy, a Tiger fan, sent his best luck from Newport.

Port's longest range best wishes came from Rex Hart, a Magpie supporter for many years.

He is now a civil servant in Durban, South Africa, but is currently in Sydney.

He, and his wife have been visiting relatives in Ireland.

The first quarter had individual starring efforts for Port and Glenelg supporters to rave about.

Port rover Darrell Cahill, set the standard in the opening five minutes with two goals from the right forward pocket.

Glenelg half-forward Paul Weston, only 17, showed surprising maturity in only his third full game.

He took a splendid mark, shot a brilliant handpass and kicked Gleneilg's third goal, as part of his opening contribution.

There were many other brilliant passages between the two well-matched sides.

PORT'S star roving duo Brian Cunningham and Darrell Cahill virtually monopolised the Magpies' early scoring.

Of Port' first seven goals each had three.

The other came from one of the best individual efforts.

Big Bob Kingston, to get Port's fifth goal, pushed John MacFarlane off the ball with his chest, without laying a finger on him.

The ball lobbed in Kingston's lap and he nonchalantly booted a goal.

IN the second term, Peter Marker, best afield in the first half, kicked the kind of captain's goal to inspire a side.

For the Tigers' eighth goal he eluded two Port opponents deep in the right pocket at the northern

end.

Then his great snap shot from nearly 50 metres out curled in ideally to goal when the ball split the middle and landed a metre behind the line.

THE closed circuit color TV was a popular diver-

Those seeing it for the first time lingered over their "one for the road" drink at the long interval—long enough to see Glenelg's Colin Anderson
