# CARMAN REPORTED

Norwood star centreman Phil Carman was reported in the match at Norwood yesterday.

He was reported by field umpire Murray Ducker for allegedly striking Torrens captain Peter Kelly with a forearm in the second term.

Carman, early favorite for this year's Magarey Medal, would be ruled out of the running for the top football award if found guilty.

The report took much of the gloss off the Redlegs' 66-point win over Torrens. The incident took place about half-way through the term, but few in the crowd had any idea Carman had been reported.

At one stage during the term, after a scuffle involving Carman and a number of Torrens players, Carman was sitting on the ground about centre half-forward when Ducker approached him.

Umpire Ducker put a hand on Carman's shoulder, as if telling him to calm down, and then went on with the game.

The Redleg star was easily best on the ground at the Parade.

## 26 KICKS

He started brilliantly at centre, picking up seven kicks in the first term.

He kept up the high standard throughout the match to snare 26 kicks, hand out seven handballs, take 14 marks, and boot 3-4.

The match was marred by a number of incidents in which players were felled behind the play.

On separate occasions Norwood's Carman, John Wynne, Ross Dillon and

Mike Poulter were put down, as were Torrens' Fred Bills, Ian Wallace and Kelly.

Ducker also reported Eagles half-forward Terry Homan — for alleged misconduct in the third term.

After the report Norwood rover Nell Craig was given a 15 metre penalty free, and scored a behind.

Pre-season favorites, Glenelg, crashed to a 21-point defeat at the hands of Port at Football Park.

Port jumped the Tigers early and, playing more positive and attacking football, remained in front all day.

In the other upset North virtually put themselves out of the premiership race by going down by nine points to Woodville at Woodville.

At Unley the league's leading goalkicker, Ken Whelan, went on his goal-kicking way with a bag of eight.

South kicked their highest score at Richmond Oval, 20-15, in downing West.

Their previous highest score on the Bloods' home ground was 17-16, back in 1965.

## Missed a big mark and maybe a game

High-flying Glenelg follower, Graham Cornes, left the field in the match against Port yesterday with a back injury.

He soared for a big mark in the final quarter at Football Park and crashed heavily to his back.

Glenelg officials said Cornes had pinched a nerve at the base of the spine which caused him considerable pain.

It was not known yesterday whether Cornes would be likely to miss any matches.

## Deep gash

Centrals half-forward Ken Russell had 12 stitches in a deep gash in his forehead and nose

after a heavy collision with Sturt rover, Robert Oatey, at Unley.

Russell was replaced by Wilbur Wilson in the first quarter.

Centrals wingman Richard Cochrane was replaced in the last term with a coked thigh.

Woodville back pocket Eddie Holland was playing well until he hurt his ankle in the second term.

He left the ground with a suspected broken blood vessel and could miss a match.

North's Malcolm Kirk was met solidly by Woodville full back Barry Tyrrell in the third quarter and left the ground with a shoulder injury.

South wingman Gordon Davis, who replaced Mark Coombe, had three stitches put in a gash in his forehead after a knock in a pack.

Coombe dropped out of the South 20 before the match with a leg injury.

## PORT WON IN FIRST QUARTER

Glenelg lost their match with Port in the first quarter at Football Park yesterday.

And Port did their best to kick the game away in that quarter.

Port kept the Bays goalless for 25 minutes of that first term. During that time the Magpies piled on 4-8.

Many of those points should have been goals. They came from set shots and not too difficult angles.

The scores were deceptive for the rest of the game.

Glenelg were only outscored by one goal in the second quarter, they got one more goal than Port in the third and kicked five goals to Port's three in the last.

## Long kicks

In the end Port ran out winners by 21 points.

It was Port's centre-half back Woite who initiated most of their attacks. His long torpedo punts invariably went straight to position.

Woite dominated the Port backline and was rarely beaten.

It looked as if Glenelg's Hamilton and Port's Ebert were set for a great duel in the centre, but when Sandland was clobbered the Glenelg man faded right out of the game.

Ebert set up Port attacks time and again and had a bag of kicks.

Gerlach was in everything and it was a wise move of the Bay directors to have two players fly over him at every opportunity.

It was here that Woite was so valuable. His towering kicks went by Gerlach opening up other attack avenues.

The Port rovers had a good day. Cahill once again played brilliantly but when he stopped a solid one early in the game, brother, and coach, John decided to give him a spell.

That was where Porplycia came in. They ran the three-rover system — changing on the flanks.

Carey was good value when resting and pulled in four strong marks for four goals.

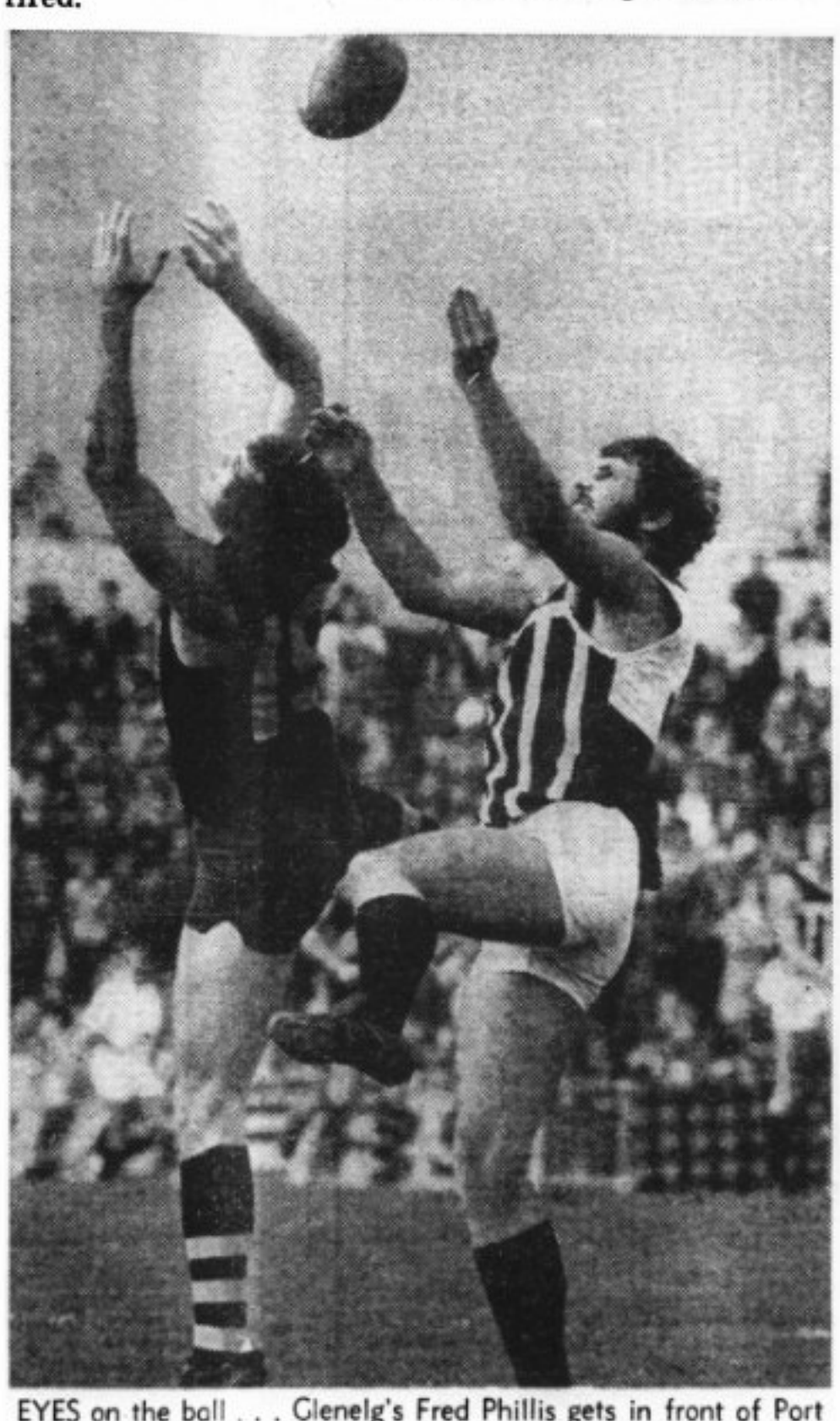
Part of the reason for Glenelg's mini revival in the second half was the dashing display by half-back Colbey.
