NORTH STUN BLUES

Patto really stirred them up

North sprang the upset of the season yesterday by defeating top premiership contender Sturt by 15 points at Prospect.

For those who are statistically minded, however, the win might not be such a great shock, as the Roosters have an enviable record at Prospect.

In fact, their record against Sturt shows that they have always been a hard nut to crack for the Double Blues when playing at home.

Since 1922 North have won 35 games against Sturt at Prospect, to the Blues' 17 wins.

The North win yester- day was sparked by a stirring pre-match team talk in the Rooster camp.

... OR ELSE!

Coach Mike Patterson took his charges, along with the entire North committee, behind closed doors and set the record straight with some very straight talking.

It is believed that Pat- erson told the players that they had only two ways to go yesterday - up to victory over Sturt, or down to the Seconds.

North responded re- markably, jumping Sturt in the first term to set up a 38-point lead at the first change.

Sturt staged a last quarter revival, which saw them have an equal number of scoring shots with North, but they still failed to overcome their early deficit and went under for the second time for the year.

They suffered a further blow when rover, Bob Oatey was reported during the game.

The report followed an incident in the second quarter involving several players from both sides.

DISMAL

Oatey was reported by umpire Peter Mead for al- legedly elbowing North's Rick Schubert.

The other shock of yester- day's round was West Adelaide's dismal per- formance against Norwood, when they went under by 59 points.

The "Million dollar side" of SA football is now out of the final five, trailing Centrals by quite a lot on percentage, despite having won four games - the same number as the Bulldogs.

Bays' day and how!

Glenelg had a record-breaking day at the expense of Central Districts yesterday.

The Tigers mauled the Bulldogs in all four grades of league football, kicking 84 goals and amassing an incredible 561 point total against Centrals. In league ranks the Centrals loss to Glenelg was the greatest defeat the Bulldogs have suffered in League ranks.

Their 141-point loss just eclipsed their previous largest losses, of 137 points, suffered at the hands of Port and Torrens in 1964. The 33-14 kicked by Glenelg was also the biggest score the Tigers have kicked against Centrals. It beat the 27-19 Glenelg kicked against the Bull- dogs in 1973.

The 33-14 kicked against the Bulldogs was also the highest score kicked against Centrals by any league team.

Norwood kicked 28-16 against the Bulldogs at Norwood in 1965 to hold this record until yester- day.

In the other grades, the Glenelg scores against Centrals were 15-13 in the Reserves, 19-14 in the Under 19s and 17-16 in the Under 17s.

It was certainly a day Glenelg won't want to for- get and one which the Bulldogs will be trying very hard not to remem- ber.—GREG REID.
