FIVE STATE MEN IN DOUBT

Phillis worst casualty

Five of the State's top football stars are in doubt for next Saturday's South Australia-Tasmania clash at VFL Park in Melbourne.

The doubtful quintet are Glenelg pair, Peter Marker and Fred Phillis, Sturt's Phil Nelson and Mick Nunan, and North captain Barrie Robran.

Robran was forced to leave the ground at three-quarter time in the North-Woodville clash.

In the first three quarters he was rarely sighted, and club officials said he was still carrying injuries sustained early in the season.

Nelson was replaced in the last term of the Sturt-Centrals clash, after injuring a knee.

Phillis is the most seriously injured, and according to Glenelg officials hopes are fading that he will be fit for training this week and for next Saturday.

Club officials hope the other three will recover in time.

On Friday Phillis's injured knee was X-rayed and although no structural damage has been detected the knee is badly bruised and kept him out yesterday.

Club officials said his left knee was badly swollen after the game, and the full extent of the injury would not be known until later today.

Nunan did not play after the third term break, and club officials said he had

injured an ankle, which would also be examined by the club doctor later today.

AGGRAVATED

Marker was forced to leave the ground in the last term of the Glenelg-Torrens clash.

He had been carrying an injured left thigh throughout the game and apparently aggravated the injury in the third term.

Apart from the Marker and Phillis injuries, the other three casualties might not prove too disastrous to SA's hopes next Saturday.

Wayne Phillis or Peter Wolte could hold down centre half-back in Nelson's place, while other rovers in the squad would probably get a game ahead of Nunan.

The obvious replacement for Marker at the pivot would be Port's Russell Ebert, who had been tipped to play on a wing.

This would leave room for another of the four specialist wingmen in the squad to get a game.

On form, Peter Wolte would probably take over centre half-forward, if not needed at centre half-back, with Ross Dillon, the logical key forward player, moving to full forward in place of Phillis.

Eagles soundly beaten but not disgraced

The top team played the bottom team at Glenelg yesterday, and the top team won by 12 goals.

Torrens hadn't won a match and Glenelg hadn't lost one when the game started, and the story was the same when the final siren blew.

Yet at times there was little between the two sides.

Granted, Glenelg always looked a slicker, more confident team, but when it came to determination,

Torrens were not disgraced.

Sadly for the Eagles, determination alone will not win a football match.

If you were a Torrens supporter and believed in such things as omens, you would have left the ground within seconds of the start, when Marriott got his first kick for Glenelg.

The ball was kicked into the forward pocket and he and Torrens defender, Fielke set off after it.

RECOVERED

Fielke was in front, but

the ball bounced badly for him, Marriott picked it up, and kicked his only goal of the game.

Glenelg had eight more goals on the board by quarter time — three of them to "apprentice full forward," Graham Cornes.

Torrens were six goals in arrears already and it looked as if another runaway win for Glenelg was in the making.

But then the Eagles recovered, and for the next 2½ quarters Glenelg could outscore them by only one goal.
