Glenelg were held scoreless in the first quarter, piled on 12-9 in the second term, and maintained control to record a surprisingly comfortable win over Sturt at Football Park yesterday.

second quarter was their highest-ever scoring term against the Blues.

The match-winning burst was inspired by big ruckman Peter Carey, elusive follower Nev Caldwell, and dynamic little rover Kym Hodgeman, who repeatedly whipped the ball away from the centre bounces to set up opportunities for team-mates.

Sturt had gained the initial advantage by captain Paul Bagshaw winning the toss and kicking with the aid of a strong wind to the northern end.

The Blues dominated the first quarter in impressive fashion, but 3-4 was not sufficient reward for the chances they had, plus the wind assistance.

Glenelg, who had offered some desperate defence in the opening term, suddenly cut loose with the type of irresistible football that has swept them to the past three grand finals.

Sturt were left floundering as they scrambled only two goals compared with the Tigers' 21 scoring shots.

Glenelg players walked off at half-time to a standing ovation, leading by 47 points, and you could sense it was all over.




