Glenelg's Colin Anderson — a depressed cheekbone fracture . . . Sturt's Ken Whelan — reported for misconduct . . . North's Wayne Stringer and Peter Sporn — taken to hospital.

That was some of the pain and sorrow to come out of yesterday's tenth round of league football. Anderson's injury is another severe blow for Glenelg, who have already suffered several serious casualties this season.

DARK SIDE OF FOOTY

The Big Dark which descended on Adelaide yesterday afternoon is certain to provoke some cries for an earlier start to league games.

All five league matches were played in unusually poor light after half-time.

The South Australian National Football League reverted to a 2.20 p.m. start for league games this season after trying a 2 p.m. kick-off last year.

SANFL general manager, Mr. Don Roach, said earlier this year the league had received a significant number of requests for a 2.20 p.m. start.

More matches are likely to be completed in semi-darkness over the next eight or so weeks.

FINAL SCORE DIDN'T TELL THE STORY

As expected, Glenelg ground Torrens into Thebarton Oval yesterday to win comfortably by 40 points.

However, the tremendous fightback by the Eagles to get within five points of the premiership leaders in the last quarter certainly was NOT expected.

Down 39 points at the first change, Torrens outscored the Bays in the next two quarters and had them almost panicking in the last.

Glenelg, their handball sloppy at times, dominated the first quarter and had 15 scoring shots to Torrens' mere one.


It looked as if it would be a case of "how far Glenelg?"

Then, to the Eagles' credit, they outplayed Glenelg but still didn't look like winners.

But quick goals from Greg White, Dirk Inglis and Barry Hank within three minutes of the final term put Torrens within five points.

Glenelg were rattled. Torrens continued to pressure them into mistakes and loose checking, and it looked anyone's game.

However, Torrens bungled in the forward lines at the 15-minute mark and Glenelg showed their experience by taking advan-

Glenelg kicked five more goals after that and the match was over.

For almost 3½ quarters Glenelg appeared to take it easy and because of a lack of concentration, they almost paid the penalty.

STRENGTH

Glenelg had a number of winners, but McInerney was their best.

He roved tirelessly and looked dangerous in the forward pocket and thoroughly deserved his four goals.

Wayne Phillis was also a tower of strength for the Bays, both in ruck and at centre half-forward.

His intelligent setting-up of play and determination set Glenelg alight on numerous occasions.

It was then that umpire Field reported Whelan.

At Prospect, Stringer, North half-back flanker, had a badly torn ligament in his right ankle and suffered possible further internal damage.

He was taken to hospital but was allowed to leave after having X-rays.

Sporn was admitted to hospital with concussion, but he may be available for North's next game — ball Park on Saturday week.
