It was a memorable struggle, one which caused 7,589 spectators to run the full gamut of football emotion and one which left both teams' players bruised. sore.

was another big playmaker, and centre halfforward David Saywell played an outstanding second half. He kicked four goals in the last


quarter. Barry Norsworthy won the courage award by playing for almost all of the last term with a severely corked
